ENGLAND NOT HIRING WOMEN WAR WORKERS

Thousands Who Rallied to the Government's Call in War Time Find Patriotism Disregarded in Their Case—The Case of Nurses Particularly Hard—Some of Them Disabled from Taking Up Other Occupations.

London, Dec. 30—England's demobilized women war workers are not receiving the same consideration from employers as are the soldiers and sailors. After war settlement of the demobilized forces is emphasizing this phase of sex inequality.

The men who left their work in answer to their country's call did so work would be open to them upon demobilization. Not so the women.

Though thousands of women rallied to the government's call, they are now finding the ironed work closed to them. Many of the women who were on active service were recruited from domestic occupations, but those who left offices, factories and dressmaking establishments are not being received with open arms by their former employers. The question of patriotism is entirely disregarded in the case of the women.


There are still 3998 former service women out of work, not including the nurses.

The case of the nurses is particularly hard.

There is no longer a great demand for nurses and many have had to be trained for other tasks. The nurses' resettlement committee, which is at-

tempting to place the nurses, is having a very difficult task.

A lawyer with only a diploma and a brass sign who would lose a suit even if the other side was ready to confess a judgment, will tell you how to run a newspaper. A physician who would send his patient to the morgue before the prescription had been filled will know all the fine points of making a newspaper. An actor who has never earned any other plaudit than a soft tomato will give instructions in handling the world's news. Any old lady who knows enough to get off a street car backwards has positive opinions of the press. Even a society person who never paid anything but a call or made anything but a visit or did anything but a tailor knows how stupid these men are who write 'stories' edit 'copy', wrestle with 'headlines' that won't fit and get the newspaper out on time.

One reason for the universality of perfection in this trade, among those who do not work at it, is that everybody has been employed in it. It is a most unusual thing to meet a man who, when the occasion seems ripe will not say 'I used to be a newspaper man myself.' Every time a man works his country editor for a puff on the strength of a big pumpkin he graduates into journalism. When he writes a 'piece' for 'The Squash County Clarion' about a 'most enjoyable entertainment' he has completed his postgraduate course in newspaper work, and when he writes a communication on both sides of the paper to the editor he has become a 33rd degree member of the Tribe of Scribes.

That so many men have abandoned literature for law, medicine and other easy walks of life, simply shows that many men would rather fall in one thing than another.

Disabled nurses—and there are a great number of them—are being trained for lighter occupations, such as photography, needlework and housekeeping. They are entitled to the disablement pension, but employers of women workers have not been requested to give work to disabled women to the extent of 5 per cent of their staffs, as was the case with disabled men.

White Fruit Cake.

Cream together two cups of granulated sugar and one cup of butter, add the yolks of four eggs beaten light; one cup of milk, four cups flour with three heaping teaspoonfuls of baking powder sifted in, the whites of the eggs beaten stiff. Flavor with almond extract. Have ready two cups of currants, two cups of seeded raisins, one third cup of candied cherries, quarter of a pound of citron shaved fine and one cupful each of English walnuts and hickory nut meats. Chop the raisins, citron, cherries and nuts fine, and mix all together. Dredge them well with flour and stir them into the cake mixture the last thing. Bake carefully three hours in a slow oven.

The total revenue collected at the port of Fredericton during 1919, calendar year, was \$158,052.27 of which \$152,737.16 was from customs duty. For the month of December there is a marked increase in duty and value of imports. For the quarter ending Thursday the increase in duty is not as marked but nevertheless is substantial. The increase in value of imports has been great, \$182,206.
