SPECIAL TRAIN SERVICE FOR THE HOLIDAYS

Daily Excepting Sunday Passenger Train on Valley Ry. Between St. John and Fredericton.

During the Christmas and New Year holiday season, the Canadian National Railways will operate a special passenger train service via the Valley Railway between St. John and Fredericton. In addition to the regular service now in effect, this passenger train will leave Fredericton (daily except Sunday) at 7:00 a.m., arriving in St. John at 10:30 a.m.

Returning the train will leave St. John at 4:30 p.m. and arrive in Fredericton at 8:00 p.m. This special service will be in effect from Monday, December 22nd, to Saturday, January 3rd, 1920 (inclusive) and will greatly accommodate the travelling public, providing also for the increased holiday travel.

Passenger Trains No. 47 and No. 48, between Fredericton and Centreville, will run daily (except Sunday) during the same period, and the mixed trains will be withdrawn.

Regular passenger fares will apply between all points.

RETURNED SOLDIERS WANT MAN IN THE LEGISLATURE

Would Like to Have By-Election Called in Carleton County—
Convention to be Held January 14th—Secretary Barter Thinks Soldier Candidate Should be Returned Unopposed—Praise for Minister of Agriculture.

The Woodstock Press publishes the following:

To the ladies and Gentlemen Electors of Carleton County:

I am writing this letter to you on behalf of the returned soldiers of this grand old County of Carleton, and I trust you will all see the justice of our request in a matter of such vital importance to us returned soldiers, and also note the minor importance of the question to the political parties of the county.

Friends:—When the call came for volunteers to defend our liberty home country and loved ones, we came forward, took part in the most terrible war that was ever known on earth, yes we passed through a real Hell on Earth, and we who were spared have come back to you, and we are now getting back into our old places, or re-establishing ourselves so as to take up our duties as citizens once more.

The Federal Government has passed and placed before us a "Farm Settlement Board" to enable returned soldiers who wish to farm to obtain farms, and now the Provincial Government of New Brunswick has notified us that they are preparing a Bill to come before the next session of the provincial parliament to help the returned men who do not wish to farm, to secure small lots of land up to 25 acres and to help them build homes and in this way return men who follow other trades will be placed in a way that they may have homes quickly and pay back in an easy way. Now this is a vital question to us and as we look over the present house we find there are no returned soldiers sitting in the provincial parliament and when the government wants information from us they must send to us outside the house; we have no representative in the house to voice our wishes. Now looking over the province we see only one seat vacant and this vacancy is in the county of Carleton, so we returned men are now petitioning the government to call a by-election for this vacancy and give us returned men a chance to elect a returned soldier to represent us in the next setting of the provincial parliament; we have every right to expect our petition to be granted, so we call a convention of returned soldiers to meet on 14th of January, 1920, to choose a man to represent us and we sincerely trust there will be no opposition offered to our candidate.

This is a very vital matter to us, and let us reason together over the matter.

The Bill coming up next session is most important to us, we greatly need a representative in the house and we have none there, and you must all admit that it is the only justice that at least one returned soldier should be present and help us in preparing a bill that is entirely for us, and where we are petitioning the government to open the house so we may send a returned soldier to represent us we do not expect the government party to oppose our nominee, for it would be most unusual to grant a petition and try to defeat the aim of the petition, and therefore we expect no opposition from the government.

Neither do we expect to be opposed by the loyal opposition for already they have a good strong vigorous party in the House and the election of one more new member would not materially alter the standing in the House, so the matter is not vital to them. We do not expect the United Farmers to oppose us for this is only a by-election and there already are several farmers in the House, and for the first time for years a real farmer is the Minister of Agriculture. He is very sympathetic to the farmers and the farming interests and anything beneficial to the farmers is gladly given by the present Minister of Agriculture, so the by-election does not seem of vital importance to the United Farmers.

So we confidently look forward to a peaceful entry of our candidate into the House.

Electors of Carleton, we do not want to stir up strife. We went away from our homes and all that was dear to us to fight for our homes, our loved ones and for you, and now we expect no

fight to be put up against us when a question so vital to us and a question minor to the three parties who now hold aloft their banners in this county, and we hope that no man will allow his personal ambition to run to such an extent as to allow himself to place or to cause himself to be placed in opposition to us.

We are aiming to keep clear of partisanship, we aim at choosing one of our comrades who will be strictly independent, and who will faithfully help to promote any measure beneficial to our county. We returned men confidently turn to our own people and ask your support; we ask for the friendly hand, and not for opposition.

Remember this is only a by-election and Carleton county should have full representation in the House. Trusting this letter will be read and received in a kindly spirit, I will close by thanking the Press in advance of its publication.

Mix well and add 1 pound of raisins, 1 pound currants, quarter lb. orange peel, 1 1/2 lbs. citron, half lb. dates (stoned), half pound figs, quarter cup walnuts, quarter cup almonds. Cut orange peel and citron into strips, bake in pans lined with greased paper.
