FIRE MAY CLAIM SEVENTH VICTIM

Quebec, March 5.—Mrs. Gaudois Dupont, who lost four children, and her father and mother in a fire at St. Ferreol yesterday, may lose her own life.

Mrs. Dupont was severely burned when she escaped by a window with two of her children. She was unconscious when the neighbors arrived to help her and has not regained consciousness yet.

The two children, who were in the house when the fire broke out, Eugene 15 years and Rosa 4 years, were also badly burned and the youngest is in a critical state.

The coroner's inquiry will start this afternoon and the funeral of the six victims will take place tomorrow.

AMERICAN DOLLARS WERE ONCE LOWLY IN CANADA

In Civil War Times They Could be Picked Up Here for Forty Cents—Not Until the Year 1879 Did it Get Back to Par—Canada was Literally Flooded With Yankee Bank Notes During the Civil War.

Toronto, Can. March 5.—There was a time when the American dollar, today worth \$1.17 in Canadian money could be picked up here for 40 cents. Those were the far-off days of the Civil War, before most of Toronto money magnates had entered the world and when Sir Edmund Walker, president of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, was a youth in his uncle's private banking office at Hamilton.

During a considerable portion of the period between 1861 and 1865 the American dollar brought 50 cents and even 40 cents, whereas the Confederate dollar brought 35 cents. Not until about 1879 did the American dollar get to par.

Canada was flooded with Yankee notes during the civil war and private individuals made a lot of money buying them and selling them after peace was declared. The late Cool Burgess, the famous Toronto minstrel of years gone by, is said to have built the row of brick houses on the east side of Upper Simcoe street from the profits he made on a trunkful of greenbacks he accumulated when receiving record salaries on the stage in the United States.

ian dollar at a discount of 17½ per cent in the United States. The return to conditions of pre-war days must necessarily be slow. The idea of inaugurating a moratorium, by which Canadian merchants owing money in the United States could not have judgements entered against them for deferring payments until exchange rose again from its present adverse condition, is, the banker declares, impossible unless both the Canadian and American Governments agreed to it.

PRECAUTIONS AGAINST FLU

Dr. Copeland, Commissioner of Public Health for New York City, has issued the following appeal in connection with the outbreak of influenza:

To Nurses—The city is suffering from a lack of nurses. Please volunteer for service at \$6 a day or 75c a hour. Persons with practical experience in nursing will be paid \$4 a day or 50c. an hour.

To physicians—Whenever it may be done safely, please urge your patients not to demand a trained nurse. Leave every trained nurse possible for work among the poor.

To clergymen—Advise your congregations about dangers from coughing or sneezing without covering the face with a handkerchief. Persons who find it impossible to refrain from coughing or sneezing should remain at home. Tell the congregation to avoid fear and to practice the ordinary rules of the simple life.

To the public—Observe the rules of simple living. If feverish or otherwise ill, go to bed and call a physician, the well.

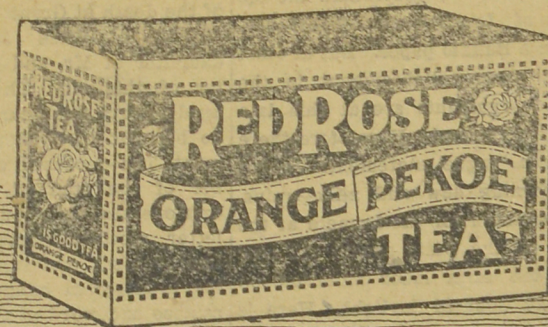
