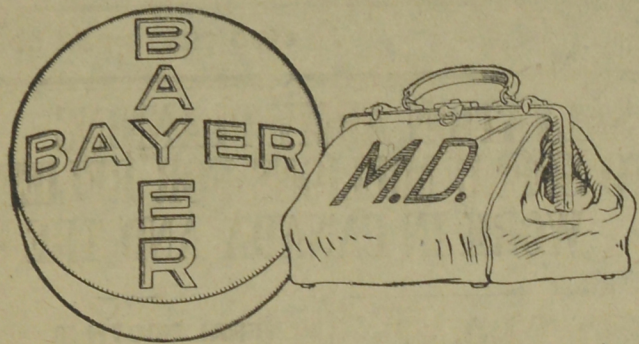

IMPENDING CALAMITY IS
THE OUTLOOK IN IRELANDSpecial to Daily Mail. Copyright 1929

Dublin, Dec. 17—Economic chaos threatens the whole of Ireland today. There is no other way to describe the outlook with which the country is faced. For the moment the calamity which is impending is noticeable only to those who think and who have imagination sufficient to throw their minds forward and see to what the present conditions are trending inevitably.

This is no mere alarmist statement. Even a casual examination of the facts reveals the truth. The railways will all be shut down in a few weeks. Their staffs are being daily reduced by the fact that they still refuse to work trains carrying government material or uniformed military or police. When such military passengers are presented the crews of trains refuse and are at once suspended or dismissed. The daily toll from this cause has been numerous and it is becoming more so. Some of the companies have already shut down branch lines from this cause.

There is no sign of the men giving way and agreeing to carry all passengers and goods presented.

With the railways closed down or even reduced it is obvious that the whole industry of the country must be gravely affected. Coal can not be brought from the ports inland and vice versa agricultural produce can not be brought from the ports inland and vice versa exchange will be made impossible, the own-dwellers will be hungry and the farmers produce will rot in his farmyard.

Other services as well as that of the railways are also threatened. In the towns the boards which have charge of the sanitary work and health welfare generally are in immediate danger from lack of funds.

Another aspect of the threatened economic chaos is the appalling losses which the country has sustained during warfare of the past eighteen months. The country's losses in burned police barracks alone will run into millions of pounds, and the material damage in reprisals by the government forces can hardly be less than that. The burnings in Brixigan, Kells, Mallow, Tralee, Drogheda, Ballymote, Grange, Tuam, Galway, and other places can hardly be appraised in money terms.

FOOTBALL GAVE
HARVARD MONEY

Boston, Dec. 18—During the 1919-20 season when the Harvard football team packed the Stadium and went through a schedule without a defeat at the same time triumphing over Oregon out on the coast, the Crimson footballers turned into the Harvard athletic treasury \$74,281.60 more than they took out. The baseball team showed a gain of \$12,486.76, but crew, track and hockey represented losses. Crew especially drained the treasury for a loss of \$17,558.73.

The men will fight for a purse of \$60,000 of which Leonard has been guaranteed \$40,000 and Mitchell \$20,000. The contestants will weigh in at 135 pounds at 2 p. m. on the day of the contest. They have posted \$5000 forfeits.

The net profits of the encounter will be donated to the fund for devastated France. The American executive committee is headed by Miss Anne Morgan. Prompter Tex Rickard has donated the use of the garden for the bout.
