REPORT OF THE JUTLAND NAVAL BATTLE

(Continued From Page One.)

their bases with definite news that the Germans were coming out. An interesting feature of the report is Admiral Beatty's now famous wireless message to Admiral Jellicoe on the night of the battle:

"Urgent I submit that the van of battleships should follow the battle cruisers. We can then cut off the whole of the enemy's battle fleet."

This message was sent at 7.50 o'clock and was received four minutes later by Admiral Jellicoe, with the request that he issue the necessary orders. It previously had been reported that Admiral Beatty's appeal was sent earlier, namely at about 7.15 o'clock during the crisis of the battle.

What the naval experts writing in the afternoon newspapers describe as one of the key signals of the battle never reached Jellicoe according to the admiralty reports. This message from the destroyer Faulkner went at 1.55 o'clock on the morning of June 1, and it probably was lost through wireless interference.

DEATH AT POKIOK

Mrs. George F. Burden died suddenly Friday Night—Well Known Lady.

Mrs. Burden, wife of George F. Burden ex-M. P. P. died suddenly at her home at Pokiok at 9 o'clock Friday night. She was about sixty years of age and a native of Prince William. Two weeks ago she attended the funeral of her brother, William Saunders at Prince William and it is thought that she contracted a cold at that time which terminated fatally. News of her serious illness was sent to the various members of her family away from home. Her daughters the Misses Dorothy and Ruth, of St. Stephen, and Mrs. W. V. Coffyn of this city reached home before their mother passed away and Mr. Burden, who was in Edmundston, reached home Friday morning and was with his wife when the end came. Her other surviving relatives are two sons Edward Burden of Edward Burden & Co., Pokiok, and Louis, at home. Mrs. Burden was a prominent member of the Baptist church and a zealous worker in all its charitable and benevolent work far and near.
