

BOYS PULL OFF BIGGEST TRAIN ROBBERY IN HISTORY

Secured Plunder Amounting to \$3,500,000, But Lost All of It But \$40 --- The Sum of \$800,000 was Burned --- Boy of Seventeen was Leader of the Gang.

Omaha, Nov. 25—Jesse James must be revolving in his tomb today. A bunch of mere kids, the leader of them only 17, has "pulled" a \$3,500,000 train robbery, the biggest affair of its kind in the history of the wild and woolly West, bar none.

In every absorbing detail of the story, which has come to light here today with the confessions of three boy bandits there is a thrill that makes poor old Dick Deadeye and the rest of his pals of the old dime novel seem like mere paltry piking novices.

Young Fred Poffenbarger, nineteen years old, calmly tells the police that he burned \$800,000 in bonds in the kitchen stove because he was afraid he and his young pals would get caught. Fred got so scared when he read that the police were giving Mearl Phillips, one of the "gang," the third degree that he hurried over to the station house and gave himself up.

Therein lies the only solace the spits of the oldtimers can get out of this remarkable affair. Jesse and Dick and the rest can content themselves in the knowledge that they never would have lost their nerve anyway. They never would have burned \$800,000 in the kitchen stove. Not by a long shot. They would have "bit the dust" first.

Sources of Information

Maybe Fred Poffenbarger and his two pals, Mearl and Orville Phillips were stirred to ambition by reading lurid crime tales or by the movies and the dime novel the goat, however until the next chapter of the world-beating holdup is written and the police locate the chauffeur of the automobile that sped alongside of the mail train and caught the bags of treasure as they were hurled out by the boys. The three boys are in the toils. The chauffeur is still at large. The boys say they are afraid to squeal on him.

Give these youngsters credit for imagination however. Chief of Police Eberstein did so, unconsciously, when he stated after the robbery: "The job was the work of professionals. It was well organized and well executed."

How the Thing was Done

Last Saturday night a mail train was speeding between Council Bluffs and Omaha. One of the cars bore millions of dollars worth of stocks, cash, bonds and registered mail coming from the Pacific Coast to Eastern banks and other concerns. At Omaha, clerks found the treasure car looted from the inside. They broke in and found the interior ransacked. About \$2,500,000 had been stolen. It was given out at first that only \$20,000 was missing, but at that very moment Poffenbarger was burning forty times \$20,000 in the kitchen stove. And incidentally, if the frightened boys are telling the postal authorities the truth all they have to show for their \$3,500,000 now is \$40. The Government has recovered \$2,500,000. If, as they say, the boys burned the \$800,000 that is definitely gone. The rest is probably in the possession of the missing chauffeur, who has four registered mail pouches with him.

CHRISTMAS CHEER FOR THE DISTRESSED

Vienna, Nov. 18—An elaborate American scheme to supply Christmas parcels to distressed families in Eastern Europe was described here by Lieutenant E. G. Burland, of the American Relief Administration.

He said the Administration would make great efforts to alleviate the distress of the poor at Christmas time. Special letter cards have been printed and Austrians having friends in the United States, Canada, Central and South America, Mexico and Pacific Islands should send these cards to their friends, who after having paid in a certain amount can insure delivery of Christmas parcels to the nominees. Such parcels will in addition to the usual quantities of food contain sugar and cocoa, which are almost unobtainable in Austria. The letter cards are distributed free at all Post Offices.

Boy of 17 the Leader

It will be more than interesting to know the complete story of the planning of the robbery, if it comes to light. Orville Phillips, 17 year old brother of Mearl, insists he directed the project. Mearl was the first of the trio arrested. Orville and Fred Say by the papers that the police were giving Mearl the third degree. Then they read that Mearl had confessed. As a matter of fact Mearl hadn't, but it worked. Orville couldn't stand it any longer. He rushed over to tell the detectives at headquarters that he was to blame. Fred rushed over later with his lurid tale of the burning of the fortune.

"I was the one responsible for the mail robbery," Orville told the police. "My brother is trying to shield me. Fred Poffenbarger and I pulled the job. We threw the bags out to Mearl in the automobile. He took four and drove away. We were alone with the other sacks. We hid them. Then we heard that Mearl had confessed, and we got scared and burned the other sacks. We only got \$90 in cash. There was one bill of \$50 but we knew if we tried to pass that we'd be suspected so we tore it up. That left us \$40 between us."

Poffenbarger hadn't even been implicated when he gave himself up. He couldn't stand the strain any longer and he had to tell his father. His father promptly took him to the police.


