GALLIPOLI HERO WILL BE DEPORTED FROM THE U. S.

Ex-Colonel in British Army and Beau Brummel of Newport Gets in Wrong and is Going to India—First Husband of Natalie Schenck Has Had a Meteoric Career—Served in the Memorable Dardanelles Campaign.

Newport April 8—Charles Glenn Collins ex-colonel in the British army ex-husband of Natalie Schenck and ex society man of Newport will soon be deported to India. Charged with the theft of jewels from Bombay, Collins has lost his fight in the Supreme Court at Washington to prevent deportation to answer the charges preferred against him in Bombay.

The dashing colonel formerly a Beau Brummel of Newport, was arrested in New Orleans two years ago, at the request of the British authorities. He escaped from custody last September, only to be captured aboard an outbound vessel by American government agents.

The tale of Collins' loves and adventures reads as from the pages of a novel. Young and handsome, the hero of Magerfontein, he laid strenuous siege to the heart of Natalie Schenck. 'Twas rumored the dashing officer was possessor of \$50,000 a year and heir to millions of pounds. Natalie was beautiful and Natalie was popular, but Natalie was poor.

In April, 1904, they were married. By steamship the honeymooners hid themselves to Honolulu. They'd belt the globe, they declared on a wedding trip.

It was five months later that they came sailing crestfallen, home again. It was whispered that Natalie had actually pawned her wedding presents and sold her jewels. Lack of finances had halted the trip.

Captivated Society

Later the first Mrs. Collins became the wife of the late William Laimbeer, while her ex-husband, his social position strengthened by his marriage to talented Theodora Wheeler, proceeded to make a conquest of all U. S. society.

New York several years ago heard that Colonel Collins had been retired from the British forces. It was shortly afterward that he was discovered, dressed as a laborer, shoveling clay for a pittance of a wage, at the South Boston works of the Grueby Faience Pottery Company. Later he dropped again from sight.


It was in 1918 that the British Government asked for the extradition of Collins upon complaint of pearl dealers in Bombay. Charging that a pearl button valued at 1,700 pounds and a necklace valued at 5,000 pounds, had

been obtained by the colonel, under false pretences, the Bombay merchants petitioned for his arrest.

Hero at Gallipoli

When it appeared that Collins had been readmitted into His Majesty's forces upon the outbreak of the European war. At Gallipoli he served with distinction.

What the Bombay merchants may succeed in convincing him of is a matter of conjecture. Newport acquaintances are predicting that the colonel will be in their midst ere another season.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Under Sub-Section 2 of Section 78 of the Highway Act 1916 no motor vehicle is allowed on any highway of the Province in the Spring of the year while the frost is coming out of the ground, without permission of the Supervisor, with the exception of physicians, clergymen and ambulance drivers. Sub-section 1 of the same section of the Act forbids the carrying of loads over 3000 pounds and the hauling of portable mills on wheels between the fifteenth day of March and the fifteenth day of May, in any year, without a written permit from the Supervisor of Roads. This notice will remain in force until the Supervisor is satisfied that the road is fit for motor traffic, as applied to sub-section 2, and until arrangement be made with the Supervisor in compliance with the Act, as applied to sub-section 1.



HIGH PRICES FOR POTATOES

(Bangor Commercial).

Potatoes have taken a jump which, in spite of all N. C. L. records, has brought the tubers into the limelight, for with Aroostook potatoes at \$8 per barrel, the highest price known, and tassel potatoes at \$2.25 to \$2.75 per bushel, the situation is one which has no parallel in market notations, whole sale or retail.

The price of Aroostook potatoes at \$8 is very nearly three times the price at which they were selling last year, which ranged from \$2.50 to \$3. The shipments at this time or year are most of them, seed potatoes, but it is stated that the price for any kind of potatoes is not below \$7 at present.

Shipments over the B. & A. are as follows: April 1, 134; April 2, 107; April 3, 153; April 4, 159; April 5, 43. The potatoes are being pushed along rapidly, the greater part of them consigned to Long Island and southern points, the big growers recognizing the value of seed potatoes from Aroostook.

Local wholesale dealers say that potatoes, now selling at from \$2.25 to \$2.75 per bushel, have not, within their memory, been any higher. All potatoes here are handled by the bushel, by wholesalers as well as retailers. These prices are on table potatoes.

Seattle April 13—A message found in a bottle near Brockton Point Vancouver, reads, "Adrift in a small boat of Plattery, Mary B. Signed, Mercien, Captain March 27th," two boats of that name belong to the Port of Seattle, and are owned by the North Western Fisheries Company. Their present whereabouts are not known.


