

VOCATIONAL TRAINING SCHOOL AT WOODSTOCK

SUMMER COURSE IN
JULY AND AUGUST

Legislation for Board to Pay a
Larger Portion of the Sal-
aries of Vocational
Teachers.

The Vocational Education Commit-
tee completed its session here at noon
today. F. Peacock, Director of Vocat-
ional Education announced at the
close of the meeting that a summer
school would be established at Wood-
stock for the training of instructors
in Vocational Education. The dates of
the school are July 6th to August 5th.
The courses will be open to teachers
and to workers at trades who may
wish to qualify as instructors. Ex-
perts will be brought from outside to
instruct at the school. The board but
not the lodging of those attending the
school will be paid by the Vocational
Board. A cafeteria will be conducted
at the school.

Suggested Legislation.

On account of the aid given by the
Dominion, amendments to the Vocat-
ional Education act have been sug-
gested by the Board. These will pro-
vide for the payment of 50 per cent
of the salaries of teachers in Vocat-
ional Education in communities with
population upwards of six thousand,
66.23 percent in communities with
population between two and six thou-
sand, 75 percent in communities with
population less than two thousand.

Also provision is sought for the
Board to reimburse fifty percent of
the cost of equipment and to afford
certain assistance in the erection of
buildings.

LOCAL POLICE LOOK FOR MISSING ST. JOHN MAN

CORNELIUS HEFFERNAN
DROPPED OUT OF SIGHT

Well Known Cattle Buyer was
in Fredericton Late in
March—Got Ameri-
can Passport.

The police of the city have receiv-
ed word of another missing man and
are endeavoring to locate him. This
man is Cornelius Heffernan, of St.
John, who left his home in the latter
part of March with the purpose of
visiting friends in Boston. He came as
far as Fredericton Junction and there
fell in with a man by the name of
Foster, a commercial traveller of this
city. It is said that the two had their
supper at a hotel at the junction and
were known to have been drinking.
However they both arrived in the city
on the evening train and Heffernan
registered at Long's Hotel. He stayed
there for a day or so and then moved
to a boarding house conducted by Mrs.
Bishop. On March 27th he wried his
wife in St. John that he would be
home Saturday and that night he reg-
istered at the York Hotel.

Went to Poston

On March 31st, Chief of Police Fin-
ley got a wire from Mrs. Heffernan,
making inquiries regarding her hus-
band, and in response to the inquiry
found that the missing man had left
for his home. On April 5th he got
another telegram from the relatives
of Heffernan stating that he was not
home and asking that further inquir-
ies be made. The Chief then investi-
gated and found that the man had ob-
tained a passport at St. John and had
left this city on the night of March
27th saying that he was going to visit
his mother who was undergoing an
operation in a hospital in Boston. This
was untrue, as his mother is and has
been right along, in St. John. It is
said that he was around Fredericton
Junction until March 29th, the Mon-
day following the Saturday he left
here. From that day nothing has been
heard of him and his relatives are
naturally much alarmed.

Dropped Out of Sight

His passport has not been taken up
at the border, and he has dropped
completely out of existence. Heffer-
nan was a cattle buyer and comes of
a respectable St. John family. He is
a married man and has six children.
His brother and cousin were here yes-
terday making inquiries concerning
