NEW YORK, Sept. 3 .- With the new theatrical season about to start, Broadway, as usual, is complaining of the dearth of chorus girls and the high cost of the young women of the ensemble, who nowadays make as much, and in some cases more, than their brothers and sisters of the drawmer."

If we could east our chorus for \$50 a week we should feel lucky indeed. It's getting to be a great game.
