INTERESTING DISCUSSION OF THE IRISH DEADLOCK

The Country Seems to be Still in the Tu Quoque Stage—Casualties Were Heavy During the Month of July—Some Statistics Compiled by Leaders of the Irish Cause—Chances for a Settlement are Now Very Bright.

(By Hugh Curran staff correspondent of the Daily Mail. By C. A. N. S.)

Dublin, Sept. 4—Ireland has not made any advance towards peace. Indeed we are still in the tu quoque stage. The rival parties stand slinging one another while the country drifts towards destruction and disaster.

Today two sets of statistics are published which give better than anything yet an appreciation of the situation through which we are passing. The Government in order no doubt to justify the stronger action which has been so often forecasted, published the casualties for the month of July. They were recited in the House of Commons by Mr. Lloyd George as follows:—15 policemen killed and 30 wounded; 4 military killed and 22 wounded, and 3 civilians killed and 5 wounded.

That is the record for one month and he thought it justified him in saying that he had no intention of postponing the Home Rule Bill, although Mr. Devlin informed him that it was the insult of the Home Rule Bill that was responsible mainly for these crimes.

Another set of figures no less significant were cited from the other side by Mr. Thomas Farren at the Irish Labor Party's Conference at Cork yesterday.

"During the past four years," he said, "the acts of aggression against the Irish nation were appalling; 75 people were murdered, 2,412 were deported, there were 653 armed assaults on unarmed civilians, 26,000 raids on private houses, 7,594 arrests, 2,194 sentences, 413 proclamations and suppressions 53 newspapers were suppressed, and there were 532 court-martials, and in addition several towns were sacked and property worth hundreds of thousands of pounds destroyed. They had to endure all this agony because the people of Ireland refused to submit to foreign domination.

At this juncture the heads of the two leading churches in Ireland, Cardinal Logue of the Catholic Church, and Dr. D'Arcy, the Protestant Primate, appear simultaneously in the newspapers appealing for peace, and the leading Unionist newspaper, the Irish Times, pleads for prayer that a miracle may be vouchsafed. The newspaper says: "If Cardinal Logue and Archbishop D'Arcy—if all the Roman Catholic bishops, all the bishops of the Church of Ireland, and the heads of the Presbyterian and Methodist Churches—could agree to make a common appeal to Ireland, would not that fine act of Christian faith and charity carry equal blessing to Belfast and Cork? Such unity would be almost a miracle, some may say; but we have reached a stage where, perhaps, nothing short of a miracle can save Ireland.

There is no question as to the general support on the question of peace, but there is yet no one "on the Bridge" the man who can deliver the goods who was called for by Mr. Lloyd George has not yet appeared. Sinn Fein as it seems to many observers sulks suddenly and will not come forward and negotiate. But as I understand it the position is this: there is a growing disposition that the Government should
