In many of the new fall models the  
lower half of the sleeve is made of silk  
if the dress is of wool fabric, or of net-  
chiffon or georgette if of satin or taf-  
feta.

### NEW FUR.

Fur will be in great demand as a  
trimming for coats and frocks next  
winter. There is to be a new kind of  
fur used. This is dyed squirrel, which  
is slightly lighter than dyed mink.

### HOW TO MAKE FUDGE CAKE

Fudge cake is one of the most deli-  
cious dainties you can make.

Here is a tested recipe.

One and one-half cups brown sugar,  
one-half cup butter, one-half cup milk,  
three eggs, one and one-half cups flour  
in which sift one scant teaspoon soda,  
two squares unsweetened chocolate,  
melted. Cream the butter and sugar to-  
gether add the milk and eggs well  
beaten, then the flour and the melted  
chocolate. Bake in three layers in a  
moderate oven. Fill with the following:

### Filling For Fudge Cake.

Put in a saucepan one and one-half  
cups granulated sugar, one-half cup  
cream or rich milk, one tablespoon but-  
ter, a very small pinch of salt and two  
squares of chocolate melted. Cook to-  
gether over a brisk fire until it forms  
a ball, when a little is dropped from  
a spoon in a cup of cold water, add  
one-half teaspoon of vanilla, then place  
the saucepan in cold water and beat  
until thick enough to spread.

### Milk Icing.

Put one and one-half cups sugar and  
one-half cup of milk in a saucepan over  
the fire; do not stir after it begins to  
boil. Allow to boil for 10 minutes then  
add one teaspoon of flavoring and stir  
over cold water until stiff enough to  
spread. (This recipe is for the plain  
milk icing. This is much more deli-  
cious, however, if chopped nuts are ad-  
ded to it before it is spread on the  
cake.)

### White Filling.

Add five tablespoons of water to one  
cup of sugar, over the fire, stirring  
until dissolved. Cook until it forms a  
soft ball when dropped in cold water,  
not stirring at all while cooking, then  
pour it slowly into the beaten white  
of one egg; beat constantly until cool.  
Add one-half teaspoon of vanilla ex-  
tract and it is ready for the cake.  
(You can make a chocolate filling of  
this by adding three tablespoons of  
ground chocolate into it before put-  
ting on cake. If desired, chopped nuts  
may be added, also.)

## SIR ROBERT MAY GO TO WASHINGTON

Ottawa, Sept. 4.—It is well under-  
stood here that Sir Robert Borden will  
have the refusal of the position of  
Minister Plenipotentiary of Canada at

## NO DROP IN BREAD PRICE

Toronto, Sept. 4.—No reduction in  
the price of bread will be made here  
for some time, notwithstanding the big  
drop in the price of flour, according to  
Mark Bredin, of the Canada Bread  
Co., who said the new flour would not  
be available until about the third week  
in September. Mr. Bredin pointed out  
that though the price of flour jumped  
\$1.60 a barrel last May, there was no  
corresponding increase in the price of  
bread. He claimed that the bakers  
even now were scarcely in as good a  
position as they were last spring,  
when the present bread prices were  
fixed. "I cannot see much chance for  
a reduction unless there is a further  
drop in flour," he said.

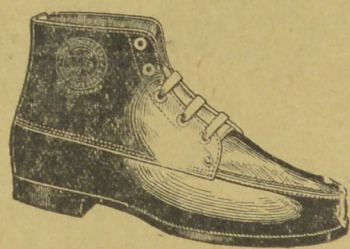

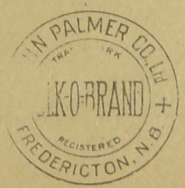
