## PREMIER LLOYD GEORGE SOON TO MAKE ANOTHER BID FOR PEACE WITH THE SINN FEIN LEADERS

### WILL NOT RECEDE FROM HIS POSITION

Is Prepared to Offer Ireland Fiscal Independence, Providing She Will Not Shirk a Fair Proportion of the British War Debt—No Change Regarding Ulster.

London, Oct. 11—Premier Lloyd George is expected to make another bid for peace with the Sinn Fein today. I understand authoritatively he will not recede from the position he outlines in the present Home Rule bill, but in addition he is prepared to offer Ireland, 1—A form of fiscal independence provided guarantees are given that she will not shirk a fair proportion of the British war debt. 2—A position for Southern Ireland on an equality with the other dominions by which she would have the right of consultation as to foreign affairs and the revision of treaties. Regarding Ulster he refuses to make any change in the provisions of the Home Rule bill. Great pressure has been brought to bear on the Premier for a modification here but even after his conference with Lord Grey last week he stood unchanged. Lloyd George sincerely believes the moderation elements of all parties in Ireland including the Sinn Fein, are willing to accept a liberal form of Home Rule, which would not endanger Great Britain and at the same time would not coerce Ulster. He is determined to put such a scheme over even if he has to oppose all the radicals in Ireland to accomplish it.

## PRACTICE RUGBY GAME SATURDAY

The second try for the visitors was given after the ball had been kicked over St. John's goal line, and Kean was tackled before he reached the piskin. The try was not converted.

## LEADER BAXTER'S PARTY SHOT TO PIECES BY THE ELECTORS OF PROVINCE

Only Twelve of His Followers Returned in a House of 48—Ex-

Premier Murray Slain in Kings and B. Frank Smith Took the Count in Carleton County—The Foster Government Will be Able to Carry On.

The provincial election Saturday was one of the most keenly contested in the history of the province. While the result was not as satisfactory in some constituencies as friends of the Government might wish, yet it proved beyond a doubt that the Foster administration possesses the confidence of the great majority of the people of the province.

Even in the County of York, which returned four opposition members, the vote cannot be accepted as one of non-confidence in the administration. In round figures, the combined vote of the opposition and farmer candidates in this county totalled 4800, while the highest opposition vote was about 3900. All the same, York will provide about one-third of the opposition strength in the next House.

### Carried Twenty-four Seats.

The latest returns available show that the Foster Government has carried 24 seats, or one-half of the membership of the House. The official opposition has carried an unlucky thirteen, the United Farmers 9 and the Labor party two. The constituencies which returned full Government tickets are St. John City, Moncton, Westmorland, Sunbury, Queens, Gloucester, Kent and Madawaska. The Government also took one seat in Kings and another in St. John County. The opposition elected full tickets only in Restigouche, Albert and York Counties. They also elected two men in Charlotte, two in Kings and one in St. John county. The Farmers elected full tickets in Carleton and Victoria and two candidates each in Charlotte and Northumberland, while the Labor men elected two in Northumberland. This is, in brief, the whole story of the election.

### Government Losses and Gains.

The Government lost two seats to the farmers in Victoria county, and the opposition lost three to them in Carleton, although they only had one man opposing them in this contest.

In Restigouche the presence of an independent Liberal ticket in the field resulted in the loss of the county to the Government. The opposition ticket, although it won out, polled less than two-thirds of the total vote cast for the Government and independent candidates.

In Queens, where there were three tickets in the field, the Government candidates polled more than the combined vote of their opponents.

The Government won a magnificent victory in St. John City and came mighty near defeating Leader Baxter in the county. Another bright spot was the victory won in Kings by Colonel Wetmore over Hon. J. A. Murray, ex-Premier of the province. Ousted from the leadership by his party friends, and defeated at the polls, Mr. Murray's position will be one which will command considerable sympathy.

## TRANSATLANTIC PASSENGER AIR ROUTE BETWEEN ENGLAND AND AMERICA MAY BE ESTABLISHED

### UNASSISTED TRIPLE PLAY IN WORLD'S SERIES

Cleveland Won Two Games from the Brooklyn Team During the Week-End.

Cleveland, Oct. 10—In a game filled with sensations beyond the dreams of fiction the Cleveland Americans defeated the Brooklyn Nationals 8 to 1, in the fifth contests of the world's series here this afternoon. An unassisted triple play by William Wambans, a native born son of Cleveland, and home runs by Elmer Smith and Jim Bagby were individual feats that will linger in the memory.

The victory broke the tie existing between the teams and tonight Cleveland is confident that the world's series banner is within its grasp. The Dodgers crushed by two reverses of Saturday and today, are clinging desperately tonight to the hope that Sherrod Smith, their left hander, may be able to check the savage batting onslaught of the Indians tomorrow, but in the view of Cleveland, everything is over but the shouting. The Indians believe they have solved the mystery of the Brooklyn pitching staff.

Two records were established during the hectic hour and forty-nine minutes occupied by today's contest. Never before in a world's series had a triple play been made by one player. So seldom has this feat been accomplished in any league that many fans recount the occasions from memory. A home run with the bases full was the other epoch-making incidents. Another home run, four doubles and a score or fielding and batting feats were thrown in for good measure.

Wambans' feat is a "Cleveland special." The Indians second baseman is a Cleveland product and Cleveland was the scene of similar play eleven years ago. If the annals of baseball are to be relied on triple plays unassisted have been accomplished only eleven times and only twice in major leagues. Neal Ball, of the Cleveland club of 1909 carried out a triple play unassisted. In a game between the Boston Red Sox and the Indians played July 19, of that year. Stahl was on first and Wagner at second with McConnell at bat, when Ball pulled his great play. Today the stage setting was much the same.

**Saturday's Game**  
The Cleveland American's defeated the Brooklyn Dodgers in the fourth game of the world's series here yesterday, winning by the score of 5 to 1, and tying the struggle for the banner. Speaker's club, almost helpless before the Dodgers pitchers during the Brooklyn games, seemed to have found the secret during their trip home. While the Indians were battering four of the much touted Brooklyn pitchers, Stanislaus, Covelskie's spit ball delivery proved altogether too baffling to the Dodgers who went out in order in almost every inning.

Disaster befell the Brooklyn pitching staff when Leon Cadore and Mamaux were knocked out of the box. Marquard and Pfeffer also gured in the game, the latter having one Cleveland run chalked up against him.

Covelskie was good, but batting won the game.

### BIG CONFERENCE TO BE HELD THIS WEEK

Reported That the Vickers Co. Have Built a Great Airship Capable of Carrying Thirty or Forty Passengers, and Will Put it to Practical Use in the Near Future.

London, Oct. 11—Behind the deliberations of the great International Aid Congress, to be held next week is an idea for the ground work of a future trans-Atlantic service between the United Kingdom and Canada and the United States", said Gen. Sir Frederick Sykes, head of the civil aviation section of the Air Ministry, to me tonight. "The congress will take up all angles of aviation with a view to urging legislation for a closer and more efficient cooperation of the industry in Europe. This eventually means the advancement of trans-Atlantic projects which are still in their tentative stages, but are not so far from practical results as some think. It is reported that he Vickers Company has built a great airship to carry thirty or forty passengers from England to America and Canada, if suitable landing places are secured.

Plans are being considered for full facilities for passenger transportation across the Atlantic and it is estimated he cost to each passenger will be three to four hundred.

## CORP. KENNEY WAS DROWNED IN SMALL LAKE

Member of Provincial Cruising Party Met Tragic Death—Body to be Sent to Glassville.

The Department of Lands and Mines has been advised of the death by drowning, on Tuesday last, of Corporal F. C. Kenney, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Kenney, of Glassville, Carleton Co. The deceased was member of a party engaged on timber-cruising on the headwaters of the Miramichi River, some forty-eight miles northeast of Newcastle. On Tuesday he left his camp for a short hunting trip. He was never seen alive by the other members of the party. When he failed to return a search-party was organized. At first it was thought possible that he might have missed his way or had been injured. The discovery of a canoe overturned in a small lake in the vicinity of the camp changed that conjecture and made the searchers fear the worst. Later the body of the unfortunate young man was found. It is presumed that Corp. Kenney went on the lake in the canoe, and in some manner overturned it, and being not a strong swimmer, was unable to save himself.

### Coroner Views Body

The body is expected to reach Newcastle today. There Dr. Desmond will view the body and grant permission for burial. The body will be sent to Glassville via the Transcontinental Division of the C. N. R., and Juniper, F. R. Kenney, brother of the deceased, went to Newcastle this morning and will accompany the body home.

### Surviving Relatives

Besides the parents there are left to mourn their loss four brothers and two sisters. The deceased was an extremely popular young man and the accident has caused the most sincere sorrow to other members of the cruising-party. The deceased had served with the C. E. F. during the war.

### Late Harry W. Cox

The funeral of the late Harry W. Cox took place yesterday. It was largely attended and held under the auspices of the Ancient Order of Hibernians No. 1 Division, who, to the number of about sixty were present to pay their last respects to their deceased brother. Solemn service was conducted at St. Dunstan's Church by Rev. Father Carney and interment was made at the Hermitage. The pall-bearers were G. T. Feeney, Thos. Feeney, Herbert McManis and Joseph Cain. The mourners were Thomas Cox and Freeman Landry.
