## MR. BAXTER AS A PROPHET ON ELECTIONS

The following predictions on the results of the election were made by Leader Baxter at a speech at the Imperial theatre, St. John, on the night before the election:

"I have learned that two whole parishes of Gloucester County are in absolute revolt against Peter Veniot and his regime. I do not say to you that the Opposition ticket will sweep that county, but I do say there will be no Opposition candidates lose their deposits in that county. So much for Gloucester." "The election of Mr. Harding (Sunbury) is sure. So also is that of H. H. Smith, the Farmer's candidate and Mr. Daniel Mersereau." (It is never wise to bet on a sure thing. The opponents of Smith and Mersereau will forfeit their deposits.)

"In the County of St. John I am willing to take my chances with my friend Mr. Carson. In the City from what I have heard from the various reports of the enthusiasm of the committees, the crowds in the various committee rooms, and the sentiments of the public generally, is going to give us four members of the Opposition." (Leader Baxter took a desperate chance in St. John County and only got in by the skin of his teeth, while his colleague went by the Board. In St. John City, the Opposition lost all four seats.)

## MEN SETTING NEW FASHIONS IN ENGLAND

(By Lydia Kingsill, staff correspondent Cross-Atlantic Newspaper Service.)

London, Oct. 10.—Men are wearing less clothes. The no-hat and shirt-sleeve habit appears to be one of the results of the war.

Men who joined the army found the rough-and-ready open-air life hardened them, and when they returned to civil life fitter than they had ever been in their lives before, they discarded much of the apparel they had accustomed themselves to in pre-war days.

The stiff straw hat has almost gone out of fashion. At the seaside and in the country one meets scores of men who have discarded hats altogether, and except when custom must be respected waistcoats and starched collars are dispensed with. This, too, when the weather is not exactly tropical.

The high silk hat, or "topper" is confined to dress occasions. Before the war every man who wanted to look responsible and impressive sported a "topper." The lawyer, the doctor, the "city" man and the estate agent went to their offices crowned with glistening dignity and clad in a frock coat and spats. No tweed-suit-and-soft-hat comfort for the professional or business man. It simply "wasn't done." Now, in England, nothing is so possible as anything that "isn't done," no matter what it is, whether wearing a certain garment or following a suggested line of conduct, or using a given word or expression, the Englishman will at once shy off if he knows "it isn't done."

But now the "lounge suit," that is, the sack coat business suit with a soft shirt and soft or hard felt hat, is firmly established for office wear, and the frock coat, spats and glossy "topper" appear only when dignity is the first consideration.

## PREPARING POULTRY FOR THE WINTER

(Experimental Farms Note.)

Do not leave the preparations for winter too late.

Get the pullets into winter quarters before they begin to lay so that they will not receive a set back but do not bring them in early in the fall unless they are well developed, as young stock on range will develop very rapidly during the bright, cool fall weather.

Before bringing the pullets in, see that the houses have been put in order, thoroughly cleaned, disinfected, and all cracks in walls or roofs carefully stopped so as to avoid drafts or dampness. All broken glass should be renewed and the cottons either mended or renewed so that they will be ready to use when required. This, however, does not mean that when the pullets are put in that the windows should be closed, far from it.

When the birds are put into winter quarters the conditions should be made as nearly as possible similar to range conditions. Keep the front of the house wide open so as to allow all the fresh air possible and keep it that way as long as weather conditions will permit.

When the stock was on range it was supplied with grains both whole and ground besides they consumed large quantities of green feed, grass and other tender vegetation,—animal feed—grasshoppers, bugs and insects,—and mineral matter,—small stones and possibly, small shells. See to it that, when the stock is confined, all these feeds are liberally supplied. Scatter grain in the litter morning and evening. Keep hoppers of dry mash con-

Dr. Wills found a nest filled with alligator eggs while on a hunting expedition recently. He brought six of the eggs home with him.

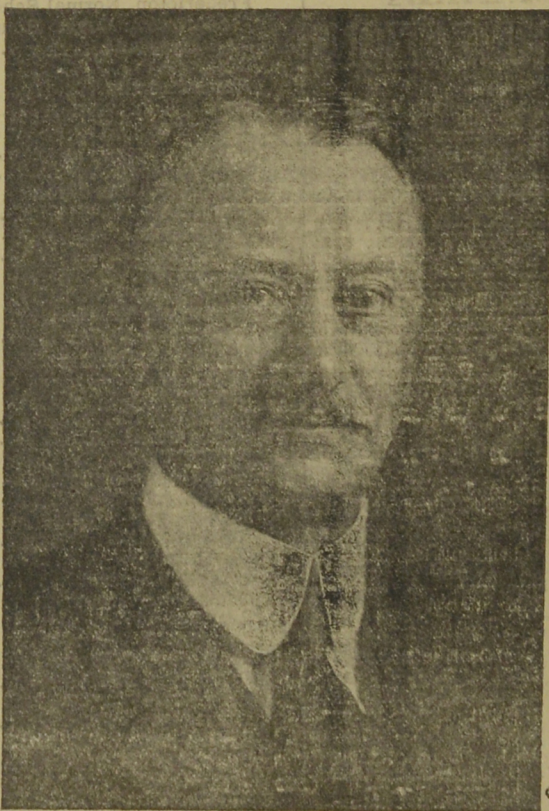

stantly before them, also hoppers of beef scrap to replace the bugs and insects which they formerly picked upon range. To replace the green feed which they were able to gather, supply rape, mangels, cabbage, sprouted oats, clover and any similar feed that is tender and appetizing. This green feed is of special importance at this time of the year and if not liberally supplied the sudden change to a heavy diet is liable to result in liver derangement.

Use judgment in feeding and handling. See that the flock never wants for clean water. Feed sparingly with scratch feed in the mornings so that the flock will continue active throughout the day.

Look carefully after the flock,—supplying dry, bright, well ventilated quarters, with feed as previously suggested and your poultry will prove one of the most paying branches of your farm work.
