Owing to the sitting of the Appeal Division, Supreme Court, which opened this morning the Court of Divorce and Matrimonial Causes is holding its sessions in the County Court House.

**Watson Case Postponed**  
Hearing in the case of Robert Earl Watson vs. May Olga Watson was postponed until 2.30 this afternoon on account of the failure of Thomas Doherty of Houlton, Me., a witness needed to prove the validity of the marriage in that town, to make train connections.

This is a Woodstock case. The defendant in this action secured a divorce under the laws of the State of Maine some time ago.

### Collier vs. Collier

In Arthur Howard Collier vs. Emma Collier, James Friel, K. C. and E. Allison McKay appeared for the plaintiff, who belongs to River Glade. The defendant belongs to Moncton.

R. W. L. Tibbitts, Deputy Provincial Secretary gave evidence to prove the marriage. C. G. Steeves magistrate, gave evidence of the defendant having taken bastardy proceedings in Moncton after separation from the plaintiff. The plaintiff gave evidence to the effect that he had been intimidated into marriage by a threat of fifteen years imprisonment. Dr. Howe A. Jones gave evidence of attending the defendant in child birth after separation from her husband. Hazen Steeves, magistrate, gave evidence relative to the intimidation of the plaintiff at the time of his marriage.

The court stated that sufficient proof of adultery had been given. Court considers.

## N. B. ALLIANCE DELEGATION TO MEET THE GOVT.

LIQUOR COMMISSION  
WILL BE ASKED FOR

Executive was in Session Last  
Night—W. D. Wilson Still  
Chief Inspector—Liquor  
Shipment.

The executive of the New Brunswick Temperance Alliance was in session here Monday night and this morning. After the sessions it was announced the chief items of business which were considered were the matter of the appointment by the Provincial Government of a commission to control the sale of liquor, as provided under The Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916, the annual meeting of the Alliance to be held in St. John beginning at the Y. M. C. A. Building at 10 a. m., Thursday, December 2; the conference of the Committee on Dominion Legislation, to be held at Winnipeg, December 9; the appointment of delegates to seek an interview with the Provincial Government on Wednesday.

### Matters Before Government

The selection of a commission to have control of the sale of liquor in New Brunswick under the terms of The Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916 will be the chief item of the interview. Rumors concerning the resignation of W. D. Wilson as chief inspector are current. Mr. Wilson stated this morning that he still is in office. As stated previously the Temperance Alliance is desirous that Mr. Wilson resume his duties as field secretary of that body.

### Liquor Shipment Arrives.

Chief Inspector Wilson announced today that a shipment of a considerable quantity of seized liquor from North Shore points it is to arrive here today.

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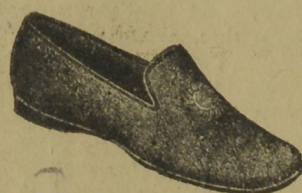
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
