Nomination Proceedings for the provincial election to be held on October 9th took place in the various constituencies throughout the province today. Strong candidates have lined up in behalf of the Foster Government in every constituency and all indications point to a decisive victory for the administration at the polls on Saturday next. It is expected that there will be at least 106 candidates in the field, representing the Government, Opposition, Farmers or Labor, which is a record breaking number for this province. The formation of a Farmers' party and the extension of the franchise to women introduces uncertain elements into the contest, but there is not the slightest doubt that the Government party will have a good working majority over all of the various groups.

St. John, Oct. 2-Hon. Fred Magee, of Port Elgin, M. P. P. for the county of Westmorland, was sworn in yesterday at noon as member of the provincial government without portfolio. The ceremony took place in the office of His Honor Lieutenant Governor Pugsley, the oath being administered by M. B. Dixon, clerk of the executive council. Besides the lieutenant-governor, Mr. Dixon and Mr. Magee, others present were Premier Foster, WATER POWERS Hon. P. J. Veniot, minister of public works; Hon. Dr. W. F. It was chiefly through initiative of Hon. Fred Magee that vocational train ing was instituted in the province of New Brunswick.
