DR. CROCKET RAPS THE N. B. TEMPERANCE ALLIANCE

Opposition Member Who Led the Poll at the Last Election Will
Not be a Candidate This Time—Has No Confidence in the
Leaders of His Party—His Reasons for Quitting Set Forth
in Pungent Language.

Dr. W. C. Crocket, of this city, elected at the head of the poll in York in 1917, will not be a candidate for re-election. In a letter sent to a local Conservative organization he sets forth his reasons for withdrawing as follows:

Chas. D. Richards, Esq.,
Sec'y Provincial Opposition Com.,
Fredericton, N. B.

Dear Mr. Richards—I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 14th inst., notifying me that a meeting of the Executive is to be held tomorrow for the purpose of considering matters in connection with the coming provincial election. I regret to have to inform you that being out of accord with the large majority of the Provincial Opposition party as represented in the late Legislature, upon matters of vital concern to the people of this constituency and of the province, I cannot see my way clear to attend.

Moreover, during the last session of the Legislature I witnessed with the gravest concern the leaders and a large majority of the party with which I was identified in the House of Assembly tamely submitting to the attempt of a small, irresponsible and extraneous organization to register its will and decrees as the will and law of the Legislature, without regard to the considered judgment and convictions of the duly elected and responsible representatives of the people. This surrender and abdication, under intimidation, of the rights and responsibilities of the constitutional law-making authority of the province strikes at the very root of our cherished system of Responsible Government.

It is already evident that in the coming contest, as a result of these attempts to throttle the Legislature, the free voice of the electorate in regard to the large matters which concern them is by no means likely to find expression—that every measure of enlightened policy must become subservient to one consideration, and one alone. While other issues will be debated, one question at present, in my judgment, dominates every other—the question of Responsible Government; whether (irrespective of party) administration and legislators are, by wholly unconstitutional methods, to be intimidated, pledged, fettered and controlled, left of their conscientious voice and action by a group of one-idea men—led by individuals holding offices of emolument under the Crown that employs them; whether self-constituted or constitutional authority shall rule, and whether questions relating to the upbuilding of our province, educational, agricultural, industrial, and the inherent rights of men and women to unquestioned liberty of moral thought and conduct must depend entirely upon the despotic behests of one small cluster of the people.

You have doubtless observed in the press that a demand was recently made by the knot of men I have referred to that a meeting of the Legislature be forthwith summoned for the purpose of enacting legislation in accordance with their ex-cathedra

pronouncements—an act of egregious stupidity from the standpoint of genuine temperance, and an exhibition of overweening presumption, beginning in sly aggression and terminating in assurance and usurpation such as the province has not witnessed in the long tide of its political history. This has been the means of finally determining the course I have taken.

Party politics have for me, at present, no attraction. Responsible Government lifts itself above every other consideration; my presence, therefore, at your meeting would avail you nothing.
