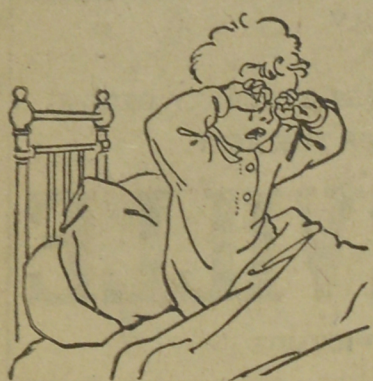

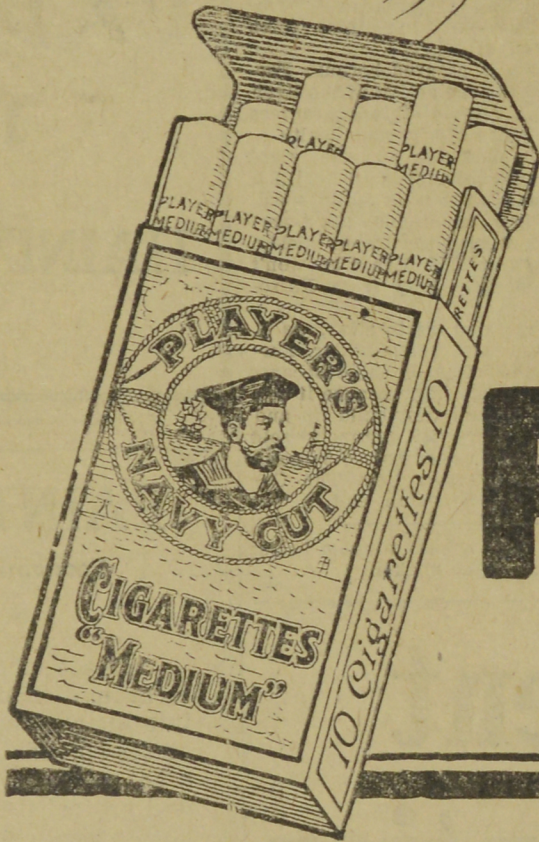
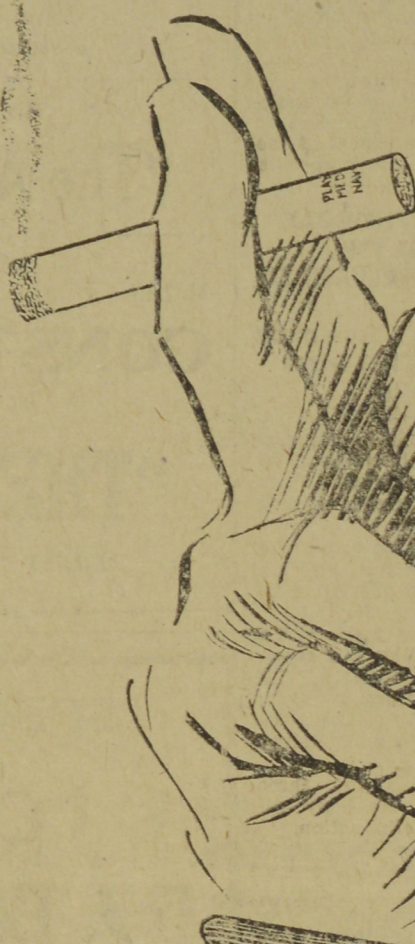

### League Meeting Here

A meeting of the Interscholastic League is to be held this year in Fredericton. The date is not yet known but will be early. Dates will be selected for the games and rules

discussed. Fredericton High will press for a regulation regarding grounds as St. John for some years past has had very poor fields for match games. The playing of masters by Rothesay Collegiate School also will be protested. Rothesay has claimed the right to play masters on its teams from the time of the introduction of the Rugby game in the Maritime Provinces.

Up to the present time the High School has worked out at the College Field but with the University squad starting its practises, will have to shift. Queen's Square probably will be used. This ground is rough but the turf has formed on it better than had been expected. Another season will see it a fair field. More work should be done upon it by the city however.
