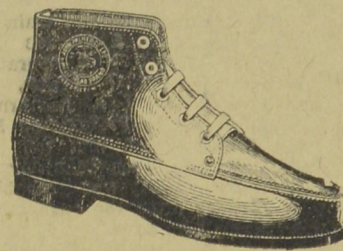

POSITION OF LORD FRENCH INTOLERABLE

Dublin, Sept. 13.—The position of
Lord French as Irish Viceroy must be
rapidly growing intolerable. For a man
accustomed to outdoor life and active
work, the hermit existence which he
is obliged to live must be utterly de-
testable. Dublin people realized recent-
ly how much the Lord Lieutenant
lives apart. During the great Horse
Show week in Dublin, it has always
been the custom for the Viceroy to be
present on at least two days. When
the show was held this year and where
some 48,000 people passed through the
turn-stiles, there was no Lord Lieuten-
ant visible. In the jumping enclosure
there is a special Viceregal box, but
while the stand itself swarmed with
thousands of people, the Viceregal box
was empty.

Then again the race meetings of Leo-
pardstown which opened the show
week and the Phoenix Park meeting
which closed it were also without the
Viceroy's patronage. The latter
meeting is held so close to the Viceroy's
residence that Lord French in his
seclusion could hear the cheers of
the multitude of spectators as the
winning horse forges his way past the
judge's box. Lord French too, is a
great Polo enthusiast although not a
player himself. The great old cavalry
leader is now too stout for an exercise
which requires horsemanship and agi-
lity in a special degree. But he is fond
of sport.

When the All-Ireland Club compet-
ed against Hillbrook Club in the open
Cup Championship in the presence of
a vast crowd of horse people, there
was no Viceroy present. He remained
within the confines of the Viceregal
Gardens only a couple of hundred
yards away.

Lord French's position is indeed be-
coming quite impossible. He is the
personal embodiment of the Govern-
ment of Ireland, and a Governor who
cannot move outside his official resi-
dence without a guard of armoured
cars less he might be assassinated can-
not be said effectively to govern. That
has been Lord French's position since

the attempt was made on his life in
December last. He is unable to take
any part in the public life of the coun-
try, and the social life which he is
able to enjoy is only whatever is pro-
vided by the few casual people who
are able to accept the hospitality of
the Viceregal Lodge.

Even there his safety is assured only
by the fact that a strong detachment
of military is quartered in the grounds
and that the approaches are securely
kept by barbed wire entanglements
and barriers of sand-bags.

The situation in regard to Lord
French would probably be quite as bad
if the office were held by any other in-
dividual. The fact that he represents
British Government in Ireland is quite

enough to make him an object of at-
tack.

Still there is a growing belief that
it would ease matters if Lord French
would resign and allow the Govern-
ment to nominate a successor or per-
haps give them an opportunity of abol-
ishing the office altogether. From the
point of view of utility it is no longer
an asset to the country.
