

An edict has gone forth from leading mode fixers here that henceforth straight fronts, long waists, high collars and skirts almost as narrow as hobbles will be the Paris idea of a well dressed woman. No longer will rounded hips move freely in the eccentric, athletic paces of the wilder dances. Instead a scarf at least twenty inches wide, either of plain or patterned silk, will be swathed tightly around the waist, maintaining the continuity of the straight line idea from chin to knee.



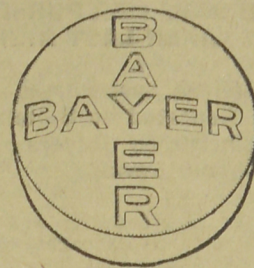
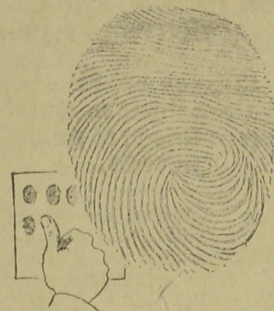

SAYS THAT PROTECTION
IMPOVERISHES COUNTRY

Dr. Michael Clark, M. P., Speaks Out Plainly at Saskatoon—

Protection Does Nothing for Agriculture, Which Depends on the Open Markets of the World—Misrepresentation by the Government at Ottawa.

Saskatoon Sask. Dec. 21—The National Progressive Party meeting held here last night at which Dr. Michael Clark M. P., of Red Deer, Alberta, was the principal speaker was attended by over 600 people.

Dr. Clark said a protected industry had to be protected with money drawn from another industry. Agriculture was an unprotected industry although it occupied forty-eight per cent of the population of the country. Protection could do nothing for agriculture which drew its returns from the open markets of the world.

Protection impoverished the country by artificially driving too many into a set line of production. Protection did not increase the population. Between 1881 and 1901 there had only been an influx of half a million into the country. Between 1901 and 1911 when there were some reductions in the tariff there had been an influx of two million. Merchandise was paid for with merchandise, therefore, the free entry of goods meant abundant exportation. Protection would not cure unemployment or there would not be a bread line in the midst of plenty as there was at Regina today.

Neither did it bring up wages, for the lowest wages paid in North America were those in her highest protected industry the woollen trade. Protection caused harm to shipping which was dependent on both out-bound and home-bound cargoes. It altered the distribution of wealth to the detriment of the people.

Dr. Clark said Premier Meighen had boasted of his cruelty to those with incomes from \$100,000 to \$200,000, but said nothing about incomes of \$50,000. The Government had pledged the last man and the last dollar. The last man had been given but certainly not the last dollar—with a hastily devised income tax brought in three years after the beginning of it all.

Doctor Shies at Facing King
Mr. Mackenzie King he said, was his personal friend, and he had little criticism to make in that quarter. He felt obliged to answer an appeal however, which had been made by Mr. King to himself and his colleagues on the cross benches. Mr. King had invited them to join him. This was scarcely an enjoyable prospect in view of the recent election results. Men who had been returned at the head of the polls did not wish to join men who had in the vernacular of the country been "snowed under."

Dr. Clark said he would be happy if what most political orators were saying in Canada were true, that the tariff was the main issue in the country. He had been trying to make it the principal issue for some twelve years. He thought that every political leader should have definite views on the subject, and he wished to point out how his own views differed from the program of Mr. King and his followers.

The new national policy wished that coal should be on the free list. This was omitted on Mr. King's list.

J. A. Maharg, M. P., for Maple Creek, stated that a nation wide cam-

paign of misrepresentation was being conducted by Premier Meighen to combat the Progressive Movement. It had started in the Colchester by-election when the Premier held a poster of a pamphlet in his hand with the pictures of the Winnipeg strike leaders. He had qualified them as seditionists, and added: "There are the men the farmers are courting."

The farmers were not courting anybody; the Progressive Party's platform was wide open enough for all; there was a wide open invitation and an open door declared Mr. Maharg.

AFRICAN CHURCH
LOSES PASTOR

Chicago, Dec. 22—Revival services scheduled for next Sunday at the Come and Be Saved African Church have been postponed. The pastor, the Rev. Charles Price, D. D., cannot be with his flock next Sunday. Quite against his wishes, he has been called to another church, the Municipal Chapel, on the West Side, informally known as the Bridewell.

Judge Prindiville, sitting in the South Clark street court, issued the call after Miss Esther Ross, a member of Price's negro congregation, had given him two peeps into the revivalists' private life.

Peep No. 1 revealed Price in careless disregard of marriage licenses and wedding ceremonies. The witness said she had no wedding ring. The Ladies' Aid and Foreign Mission Society, though, knew her as Mrs. Price.

Peep No. 2 glimpsed the revivalist in the act, to use the witness's words of "just plumb kicking the daylight out of me, Judge."

Price stoutly denied the accuracy of both peeps.

"Taht no your Honor," he protested. "I never did beat that woman. I hope to drop dead right here in court if I did."

"You can't drop dead in my court," said the Judge. "You go right up to the Bridewell and do your dying there. And you can stay up there until you have served out \$50 and costs."
