PRaise FOR MR. CALDWELL

The Hartland Observer in noting the activities at Ottawa of Mr. Caldwell M. P. for Carleton-Victoria pays him the following tribute:

"New Brunswick's most prominent parliamentarian these days is T. W. Caldwell, the farmer member from Carleton-Victoria. He has shown a fluency of speech and a wealth of bright ideas. He is fearless and outspoken and appears to be a genuine surprise to the older members on Parliament Hill.

"When the matter of increased indemnity came up the government forces were unanimous in signing a round-robin to increase the indemnity to \$4,000 or \$5,000. They felt that they must have the unanimous consent of all the members before adopting this measure.

"Mr. Caldwell was the first of the farmer members to be approached and while he believes the present indemnity is not sufficient, he knew what indemnity he was to receive when he went to parliament and he purposes carrying out his contract and not ask for any additional payment in the middle of a session. His refusal to sign the round-robin defeated the proposed increase of indemnity and saved the country a million dollars."

Mr. Caldwell is certainly proving himself a live wire at Ottawa. He is not only rendering good service to his own constituency, but seems to be keenly interested in the welfare of the constituency of York-Sunbury. His activity in connection with the proposed extension of the Valley Railway from Meductic to a point on the Maine border should be warmly appreciated by the people of this constituency.

Hamilton Herald: In the Herald's opinion Sir Henry Drayton has made a mistake in yielding to the demands which have been made by various deputations for radical changes in his tax scheme. It is all right to introduce modifications and to add to the list of taxable commodities some which had been overlooked. But such drastic changes as he has announced exposes him to the charge of vacillation. Critics of the Government are justified in asserting that if his original proposals need to be so radically altered now, after being in force for nearly three weeks they must have been crude and ill-considered, and that the Finance Minister should have made sure that he was right before going ahead with his tax schemes.

St. Thomas Times-Journal: The habit of vacation is growing on the people. METHODIST CONFERENCE FINISHES WORK

Sackville, N. B., June 16—At Tuesday morning's session of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island conference of the contingent fund report was given. It was moved to amend it and make the amount \$600. The report of the committee on religious education was submitted. Statistics showed a total enrollment in Sunday schools of 16,630 officers and teachers 1799; to total 18449; raised by Sunday schools for all purposes \$19,806.32, an increase of \$2,075.

It was recommended that O. H. Peters and Christopher Graham be appointed representatives to the Tuxis Boys camp to be held in Prince Edward Island, to the New Brunswick camp at Chipman, Rev. George Tilley; provincial board of boys' work, Rev. Robert Smart J. M. Rice, O. H. Peters and P. A. Fitzpatrick.

The superannuation fund committee reported that \$3,843 had been paid by the ministers and \$7,992 for the circuit, Rev. H. S. B. Strothard was appointed treasurer of the conference superannuation fund.

The following were appointed a committee on co-operation with other denominations:

President of the conference, and superintendent of missions, Rev. Messrs G. M. Young, F. G. Dawson, G. A. Ross, H. E. Thomas, Dr. J. M. Palmer, and Messrs. W. B. Snowball, J. H. White.

The election of district officers resulted as follows; chairman and financial secretary in each district; St. John district, H. A. Goodwin, Neil McLaughlin; Fredericton district G. M. Young, J. B. Young; Woodstock, W. A. Wightman, C. S. Flemington; Chipman, G. A. Ross, H. S. B. Strothard; Sackville, W. H. Barracough, C. K. Hudson; St. Stephen, D. R. Chown, Thomas Hicks; Charlottetown, H. Pierce, E. S. Weeks.

It was resolved to hold the next annual conference at Sackville next June.

The conference closed its sessions at noon today.

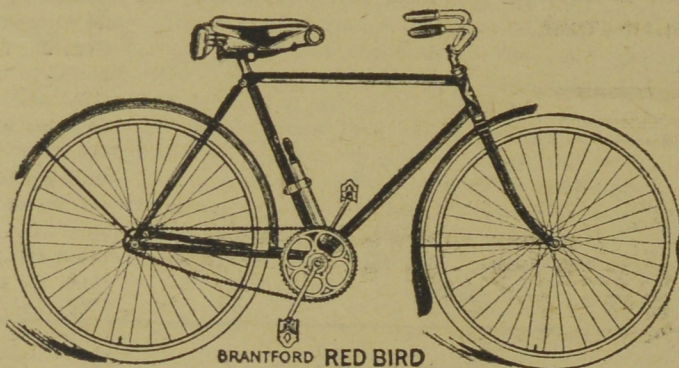
