SHINPLASTER BANK HAS AT LAST GONE TO THE WALL

Sailor Lost Faith in Human Nature and \$1,728 in Cash as Well
—Had the Money Hid Under a Porous Plaster Attached to His Leg—The "Bank" was Rifled During the Course of a Hold-up.

The latest form of that ancient and much discredited institution the personal bank has failed, and apparently it was a good bank too. The proprietor of this bank was an ingenious sort of person, but a failure as a financier. He made the basic mistake of trusting himself wholly through his fear of trusting others at all.

Having already lost faith in human nature he has now lost faith in himself and lost \$1,728 in money as well.

The victim in this case was a frugal and hard working sailor. The novel means he had evolved for keeping his savings out of the hands of dishonest folk was to hide his money under porous plasters attached to his leg. All might have gone well had not his secret been discovered. In the course of a holdup, in which he was the central figure, his trousers were slit with

a knife and the "bank" rifled.

This practice of hiding away valuables is almost as old as the human race itself and almost as full of holes. It probably began when the cave men hid away their rude treasures in fissures in the rocks or a cavity in a gnarled tree. It persists in the dog which buries a bone or the squirrel which hides a nut.

Have Hiding Places.

Even among persons who understand the stability of banking there is a tendency toward individualism in this respect. Bankers themselves have been known to have a secret hoard under a loose board in the attic as a last anchor to windward in case everything else should go wrong with the world—and also to have lost their treasure when the house burned down.

It is true that this sort of bank is safe from the ordinary pickpocket but it is not immune to the attacks of the burglar or the thug.

Nothing Like Bank Book.

The most common way they have of carrying money in what they consider safety is the money belt tightly strapped about the waist. This is safe enough except when they are asleep or overpowered by a thug.

Hatbands are frequently used, and also the lining of clothing, but none of these is anywhere as safe as a good bank, a check book and a fountain pen, according to the experiences that come to almost all of them.
