THE OTHER WOMAN'S WAY.

As soon as macaroni has been drain-
ed and blanched by throwing it into
cold water, it should be mixed with a
little butter to keep it from sticking
together.

Melted butter should be rubbed on
clean potatoes when they are to be
baked. This keeps the skin from get-
ting thick and hard.

If soup must be served as soon as
it is made, and there is no time to let
the grease harden, a piece of ice
should be put in it and then taken out;
then remove the grease that has hard-
ened on it, put it in again, and repeat
until the grease has all hardened on
the piece of ice.

The saucepan in which macaroni is
to be cooked should be buttered. This
will prevent the macaroni from stick-
ing.

Dried bread crumbs absorb more
liquid and therefore are better for a
moist dish, but crumbs grated or
crumbled from a fresh loaf take a
lighter, more delicate color, and are
better therefore for a very dainty dish.

Always when mixing a milk mixture
with another, the other mixture should
be poured over the milk. This prevents
curdling. For instance, in mixing toma-
to and milk, add the tomato to the
milk. In mixing meat stock with cream
sauce, pour the meat stock into the
other. Add also a small pinch of soda.

Meat should never be pierced while
it is cooking, thus allowing the juices
to escape.

When you wish to cut thin slices of
bread you should heat a steel knife
over the fire to do it with.

After cleaning lettuce and celery
they should be wrapped in a damp
cloth and placed directly on the ice
for half an hour or longer to become
crisp.

Mayonnaise butter, milk, cream and
cheese should all be kept closely cov-
ered, as they all absorb odors from
other foods readily.

When you make an angel cake you
should plan to make a sunshine cake
and a bowl of mayonnaise, to use the
yolks.

EGGS IN CRUST

Cut slices of bread a little thick and
scoop a hollow in the centre of each
leaving the crust as a rim. Grate some
cheese, season it with salt and paprika
moisten it with milk and spread the
mixture on the bread. Then turn an
egg without breaking the yolk into
each piece, dot it with butter and bake
about 10 minutes.

RAISED TEA BISCUIT.

Ingredients one cupful of scalded
milk one-fourth cupful of butter three
yeast cakes, one tablespoonful of sugar,
one-half teaspoonful of salt, white of
one egg, and four cupfuls of flour.

Make a nice sponge, letting it stand
in a warm place in a pan placed in
warm water than add the flour, knead
it for 20 minutes, and divide into dis-
cuss-sized pieces. Let these rise in the
baking pan until twice the first size,
and bake.

He was informed that the D. S. C.
R. maintained representatives there.
Only three persons were in the Em-
ployment Service.

City Auditor Scott said that W. M.
Clark, agent for the building was
anxious to relieve the city of the
lease.

Ald. Wilkinson's motion was car-
ried.

Mayor Reid stated that the Provin-
cial Government had asked \$2,500
for the Pumping Station site, in re-
sponse to an offer to purchase. The
city had then offered \$2000. Otherwise
the government was asking \$100 per
year. He believed the province was
not using the city properly. There had
been a verbal agreement to give the
city free use of the site. If purchase
was to be made the price should be
based on land values at the time that
agreement was made. However the
matter should be settled one way or
the other.

On motion the matter was referred
to the Finance Committee to make as
satisfactory arrangements as possible.

City Engineer McDowell suggested
that a right of way from the Victoria
Hospital be secured. Otherwise there
would be difficulty in delivering coal
after the proposed coagulating basin
would be built.

It was decided to look into this mat-
ter.

Victoria Hospital Endowment

Mayor Reid said that at a meeting
of the Hospital Board it had been sug-
gested to have a permanent endow-
ment for Victoria Hospital. It had
been suggested to hold a meeting on
Friday next to discuss the matter.
The Board of Trade, Commercial Club
and City Council were asked to be
represented.

On motion Ald. Cain, Ald. Jennings
and Ald. Hall were appointed to rep-
resent the City Council at this meet-
ing.

City Weigh Scales

Ald. Cooper brought up the matter
of handling the City weigh scales. He
was opposed to putting the fees up to
auction as there was a chance of an
unsuitable person bidding them in.
For the present month a man had
been placed in charge of the scales.
He suggested that he be continued for
the month at least.

Wharfage and Anchorage

The matter of wharfage and anchor-
age fees was brought up.

Ald. Barker suggested that one man
be placed in charge of both scales and
wharves. It was said that some of the
lumbermen and tugboat owners were
thinking of bidding in the wharfage
fees to avoid the extortionate charges
which had been made during the last
few years.

On the motion of Ald. Wilkinson
the matter of wharves was referred to
the Wharves Committee with author-
ity to sell wharfage and anchorage
fees.

Aberdeen Street Extension

A petition for the extension of Aber-
deen Street across the C. N. R.
tracks to University Avenue was pre-
sented.

Ald. Neill spoke strongly in support
of the petition pointing out that Aber-
deen Street would be extended
through the Lynch property and make
it an artery of traffic for the rear por-
tion of the city.

Some years ago there had been an
agitation to open the street. Thomas
C. Allen had prepared to erect a dwell-
ing across the line of extension and
an injunction had been taken out.
Moses Mitchell Mayor of the city then
had declared that the extension never
would be needed and the house had
been built. If the extension were made
it would be necessary to remove that
building. There was urgent need of
connection with University Avenue.
Union Street had been cut off by the
railway and the same had happened
Aberdeen Street. One or the other of
these streets should be extended be-
fore any further railway development.

There was discussion some favoring
extending Union Street.

The matter was referred to the City
Engineer to report back.

Ald. Cooper's Protest

Ald. Cooper complained with regard
to charges for police station improve-
ments being made against the City
Hall Department. They should be
against the Administration of Justice
Department.

Ald. Neill gave notice of motion to

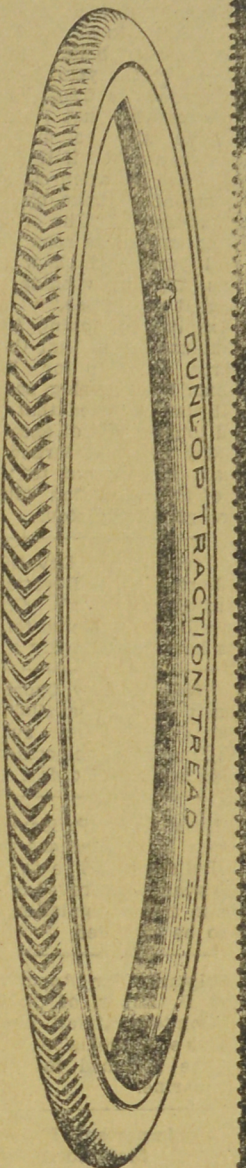

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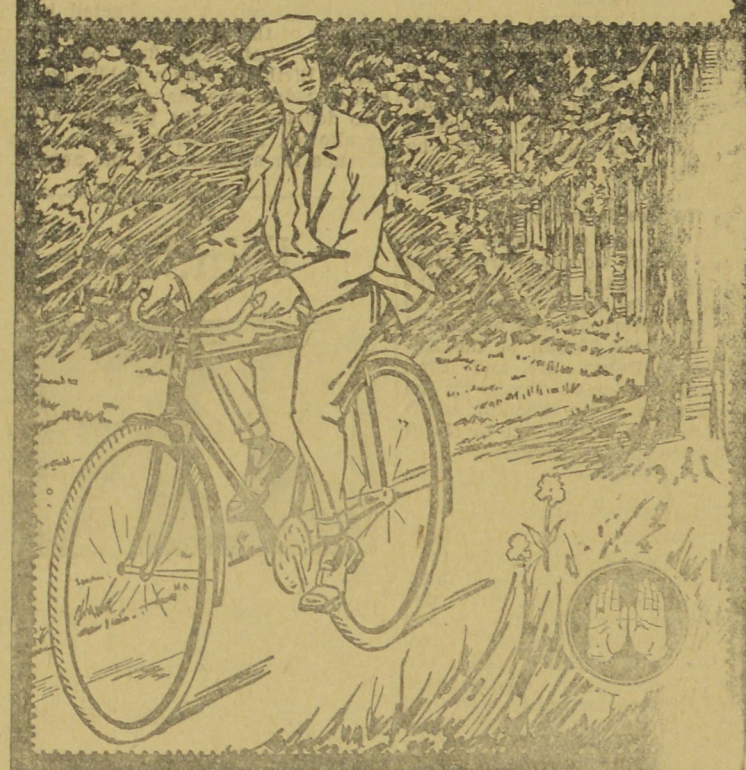
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ation of the owners of public vehicles
was to make the fee for a non-resi-
dent \$50 and for a resident \$15. He
said it was desired by liverymen of
the city not to have people of Marys-
ville or Devon classed as non-resi-
dents.

The opinion was expressed that it
would be impossible to impose such a
license fee on a resident of York
County.

Magistrate's Salary Increased

For the Administration of Justice
Committee Ald. Cain reported that a
conference had been held with Police
Magistrate Limerick relative to his ap-
plication for an increase in salary.
The magistrate had placed any infor-
mation desired at the disposal of the
committee. As a result of the inter-
view the committee recommended that
the salary of the Police Magistrate

be increased to \$1000. The recom-
mendation was adopted.

New Sprinkler

Ald. Camp moved that the Street
Committee be authorized to purchase
a two horse street sprinkler. The
horses already had been purchased.

Ald. Wilkinson suggested a motor-
sprinkler as more economical.

His suggestion received support
from Ald. Neill and Ald. Young. Ald.
Camp said the financial position of the
city would not permit of the purchase.

City Engineer Mcowdell said that
a motor sprinkler would cost seven or
eight thousand dollars.

Ald. Wilkinson said that was more
than he had expected.
