NOT CAUSING MUCH WORRY AT OTTAWA

Government Has No Notification of Proposed Visit of Sir Auckland Geddes to Canada.

Ottawa, Ont. April 28—In official circles here speculative comment from Washington regarding the status of Canada's representative to that Capital, is viewed as "Good Newspaper Stories" but is not causing worry. The government has not yet been notified that Sir Auckland Geddes intends to come to Canada to carry on negotiations in person. The new British Ambassador to Washington has not yet been received by President Wilson and until he has been it is not expected that he will decide upon his Canadian visit. In the meantime there is an agreement that negotiations between Canada and the Imperial authorities shall remain secret until information is given out concurrently. Talk of reducing the Canadian Representation to a sort of commissioner-ship, subservient to the British Ambassadorship does not commend itself to the Canadian authorities. The general impression here is that the Government will insist upon him having a status sufficient to enable him to deal fairly and independently with purely Canadian matters.

A good start has already been made with the plans for entertaining the party of American journalists who are to visit Fredericton early in June. Our interests are closely interwoven with those of the New England States and all should be interested in seeing to it that the visitors are made to feel at home during their stay here. Their tour of the province is pretty sure to give a stimulus to tourist travel.

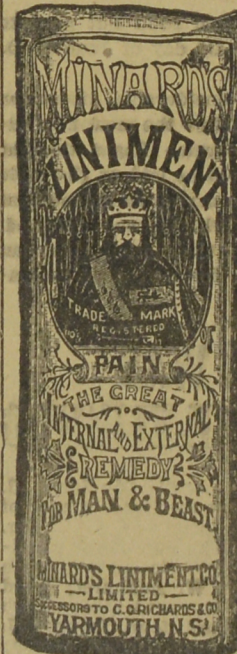

CHANGES IN TRAIN SERVICE ON MAY 2ND

Mixed Train from St. John Will Arrive at 11 a. m.—Other C. N. R. Trains Unchanged.

Time changes effective on Canadian National Lines May 2nd affect only No. 241, the mixed train from St. John on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. This train will leave St. John at 6.00 a. m. and arrive in Fredericton at 11.00 a. m. (Eastern Time).

There will be a new Sunday service between St. John and Moncton. Train No. 50 will leave St. John at 9.30 a. m. (Sunday only) and reach Moncton at 1.00 p. m. connecting with No. 199 and No. 200 Ocean Limited. No. 49 on Sundays only, will leave Moncton at 4.20 p. m. and reach St. John at 7.35 p. m.

No. 10 the night train from St. John for Halifax will leave (except Sunday) at 11.45 p. m. No. 14 for Halifax (except Sundays) will leave at 1.15 p. m.

The double daily except Sunday service to Prince Edward Island will go into effect. Connecting trains from St. John are No. 13 leaving at 7.10 a. m. and No. 14 leaving at 1.15 p. m.

The French liner Touraine arrived this morning from Harve with 933 passengers. The passage was a stormy one, and the passengers suffered considerable inconvenience from the rough weather. Captain M. F. Hanlon of Richmond, Va., was the only casualty. His right arm was broken on April 11, the second day at sea when he was thrown down one of the companionways during a particularly violent blow.

Mme. J. Krichbonn, a Parisian fashion writer, arrived in search of funds to care for Parisian ship girls in an organization to be formed there, similar in its purpose to the American Y. W. C. A. Mme.
