A UNIFORM FIRE CALL

St. Thomas, Ont., Aug. 4—Adoption

ation at their meeting here today. A
resolution was forwarded to the Do-
minion Railway Commission and com-
mittee named to appear before the
board and explain the advantages of
such a move.

fostered the idea, is chairman of the
committee. The convention decided
not to suggest uniform traffic rules
for the Dominion, believing that each
municipality should make its own reg-
ulations.

QUEBEC M. P. REPLIES TO THE NEW PREMIER

Ottawa, Aug. 5.—"Mr. Meighen has
taken over the leadership of his party
on the eve of its being supplanted and
it is fortunate for the party that he
has for he will make a most shrewd
and capable leader of the opposition,"
said Major Thomas A. Vien, member
for Lotbiniere, and one of the stal-
warts of the Liberal party in the Fed-
eral House to the Canadian Press.

Every loyal citizen would re-echo
the sentiments expressed in the new
Prime Minister's speech at Portage la
Prairie, "but this plea is a very much
changed note to the one struck in 1917
when the cry from the government
side was "Down with French domina-
tion and Popery," and "Shall Quebec
rule Canada?"

"Mr. Meighen may not have used
these words, but the publicity com-
mittee of his party did and he bene-
fitted thereby," added Mr. Vien. How-
ever, he said, the people of Quebec
were broadminded and being loyal
and good citizens in every sense of the
word.

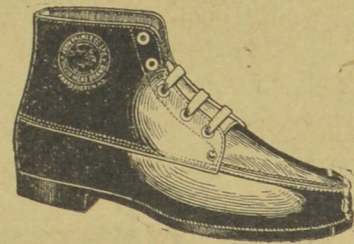
French wood runners and trappers
in the employ of the Northwest Com-
pany, then the great rival of the Hud-
son's Bay Company, visited Cumber-
land House on their way toward the
Athabasca region in the latter part of
the eighteenth century. They had with
them the casks of rum to be used in
trading with the Indians for furs.

The Hudson's Bay Company claimed
exclusive trapping rights in the coun-
try and disapproved the use of liquor
in bartering with the natives. The
Hudson's Bay Company men blocked
the passage of the French voyageurs
through the territory and turned them
back. Before they began their retreat
the Frenchmen buried their rum. They
finally reached Fort Garry, now Winni-
peg.

Their diary of their adventurous
journey was found recently and it told
of the burial of the liquor. It did not
indicate, however, the exact spot at
which the cache was made.

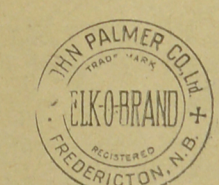
