THE REPUBLICAN VICTORY

In commenting editorially on the United States elections the New York World, a Democratic newspaper which gave strong support to Governor Cox, has this to say:

"It was literally the candidate of the Republican party who was elected yesterday."

"By no stretch of imagination could it be called the election of a man."

"No personal qualifications, power, impressiveness or popularity elected Harding."

"No candidate ever roused less enthusiasm among voters who supported him. No candidate ever made a more colorless campaign. No candidate ever more lamentably failed to keep up even a show of intellectual strength or consistency."

"The best minds in his own party could only support Senator Harding by pretending he meant the opposite of what he said."

"He has been a puppet candidate with two faces and a double set of strings."

"Senator Harding goes into the White House not because the rank and file of the Republican party cared a fig for putting him there rather than another man, but because a restless country, feeling the after effects of war, found itself irresistibly impelled to rebuke the Democratic party for having been associated with burdens and unaccustomed disturbances of the national life inevitably resulting from war."

"The Republican party bosses well estimated the calibre of candidate they could afford to risk running in a presidential campaign that found a large part of the people of the United States in this frame of mind."

"For that was what elected Harding. Not a principle, not an issue, not even a genuine interest."

"Just a state of mind."

Article X of the covenant of the League of Nations which was the chief issue in the U. S. presidential elections, is as follows:

10—The members of the League undertake to respect and preserve as against external aggression the territorial integrity and existing political independence of all members of the League. In case of any such aggression the Council shall advise upon the means by which the obligation shall be fulfilled.

Many leading Republicans such as Ex-President Taft, Charles E. Hughes, and Herbert Hoover, are favorable to the League of Nations, but gave their support to Senator Harding.

Auckland, N. Y., News: Labor will come back very shortly to the hustings, and, with the aid of the big drum, political megaphones, and convenient perches on the highest rooftops it can secure, will declare to all the sundry that it, and it alone, has worked for the welfare of the nation during the session now closed. Most of this, in a sentence, will be sheer bunkum.

All furs caught in Alberta after November 1st will be subject to a five per cent royalty, which will go into the provincial treasury as a new form of public revenue. The royalty will be payable by the dealer on all furs as soon as they come into his hands. A fair market value at the prices prevailing at the time will be the basis of the assessment.

The recount of the ballots in the St. John County election was begun yesterday before Judge Armstrong at St. John. Thirteen out of the twenty-five ballot boxes were disposed of during the day and showed a gain of eleven votes for Mr. Baxter. Ballots containing crosses opposite the names were counted by the Judge.

According to figures just published by the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture there are in the province 76,737 horses, 332,998 mitch cows and other cattle, 280,090 sheep, 92,925 swine and 753,234 poultry. This year 29,485 acres were sown to wheat, 309,971 acres of oats, and 726,380 to hay and clover.

Perth (Australia) Western Mail: There was a recent wail from Westralia to the effect that State's railways for the year just closed lost in round figures £400,000, or about £150 per mile. That, of course, is quite apart from the loss on Federal lines inside the State.

It now seems likely that Senator Harding's total vote in the electoral college will run up to the 400 mark. The Republicans will have a majority of 150 in the House of representatives and one of 20 in the Senate. The Republican victory is said to be the most decisive since the Civil War.

In addressing a political meeting at Vancouver a few days ago Hon. J. A. Calder wanted to know how many high protectionists were in the audience. "None," was the reply of a man in the audience, "they are all on the platform." This bright sally provoked roars of sustained laughter.

A Montreal despatch says that the sugar market has become demoralized and that a further cut in prices is likely. Some of the refineries are reported to be selling sugar as low as 14 cents.

The women voted in the Presidential election in the United States this year for the first time and helped the Republicans to roll up an enormous majority.

In the referendum on light wines and beer taken in Massachusetts, the wets are reported to have secured a majority of 19000.
