Generally the dresses will be a little longer and more ample. Dresses of red, blue and yellow were to be seen, but black and white kept the premier position for smart tailored costumes. There were numerous velvet coats and dresses trimmed with the new and fashionable camel's hair material. One particularly striking costume was of ermine, with blue as trakhan pockets, cuffs and collar. The skirt was a straight sheath of black silk, with bands of astrakhan fur, and was worn with white silk stockings, diamond buckled patent leather shoes and a Directoire black hat. trimmed with ermine.

Capes of cloth and velvet are ample and often are trimmed with fur. The novelty with them is a Futurist silk lining on a blue backgroundgreen and yellow shooting stars and fiery tailed comets. These form most pewildering patterns.


