

FOURTH FIRE IN SERIES BY INCENDIARY

ATTEMPT TO BURN BARN
ON T. LYNCH PROPERTY

Two Alarms for Same Fire—
Everett, Smith and Lemont
Fires All Thought to
be Set.

The fourth of a series of fires during the autumn which had every appearance of being incendiary, took place last night at the property of Mrs. T. Lynch, Regent street. The fire was beneath a barn some distance from the residence and immediately adjoining the Regent street school yard. The solid construction of the building prevented the flames from getting a hold on the interior but the fire department was engaged some time in putting out the blaze. This morning there was an alarm for a recurrence of the same fire. Little damage was done the building at either time.

Other Incendiary Fires.

Three other recent fires which had every appearance of being set were at F. H. Everett's floor-mill, a stable occupied by Roy W. Smith and the building in Queen street immediately adjoining the old Legislative building owned by Mrs. J. M. Lemont.

Investigation Needed.

Investigation into the causes of these fires is needed. The police for some time have been working in connection with the Smith and Everett fires. Boys are blamed by some but others believe that the fires are the work of a "fire bug", some person with distorted mentality.

Defendant Won Case.

A traffic by-law case in which A. E. Hanson was defendant was dismissed in the police court because of doubt.

OPERATION ON ARTHUR NOBLE AT HOSPITAL

REPORTED THAT HE CAME
THROUGH ALL RIGHT

Stevenson Remanded Until the
12th Inst.—His Revolver
Turned Over to the
Magistrate.

Arthur L. Noble of this city who was shot at Penniac Wednesday night by Herbert Stevenson also of this city was operated upon at the Victoria Hospital. Today the hospital reports that Mr. Noble is in an unchanged condition and that he came through the operation all right.

Stevenson Remanded

Herbert Stevenson charged with wounding Arthur L. Noble with the intention thereby then and there to commit murder, appeared late Thursday afternoon before Police Magistrate Walter Limerick and was remanded until the 12th inst for examination.

Revolver Handed Over

The revolver which Stevenson had with him the night of the shooting was handed over to the police magistrate by Sheriff Hawthorne when the prisoner appeared. It was a .32 calibre weapon with all of its five chambers charged. Five shells which were on Stevenson's person also were handed over by the sheriff. The latter secured the weapon from W. Harry Allen to whom Stevenson had given it.

The accused did not seem to be very much disturbed over the situation in which he had been placed. After his appearance in the police court he was taken to the county jail under the escort of Policeman Fred McLean.

Varying Stories Told

Varying stories are being told by people of Penniac concerning the circumstances of the shooting. Some are said to have gone to the Donalds place attracted by the disturbance and say that they saw a man with a revolver in his hand walking through the bushes as if he was searching for something. The statement also is made that the shots were fired from a clump of bushes and not from the end of the barn and that Noble, Mrs. Stevenson and her sister Miss Brewer were walking from the Donalds house toward Noble's car which was parked in a field at the foot of a hill when the firing took place. Another story is that the wounded man ran some distance after being struck by the bullet.

New Business Firm.

Two more of St. John's prominent war veterans have entered business on their own account. It was announced yesterday that Norman P. McLeod formerly major with the Canadian Siege Artillery, and George A. Gambelin, who commanded the local section of the 2nd D. A. C., have gone into business as Gambelin & McLeod. Both were in Fredericton with the 2nd D. A. C., and Mr. McLeod is a former resident of this city.

The driver was unable to stop the animal, so the whole outfit proceeded down the street, narrowly missing several cars standing at the curb, until Policeman Fred McLean seized the frightened steed at the corner of Queen and Carleton streets. Mr. Arseneault turned the team and started west. Again the horse broke its harness and made a great effort to keep one jump ahead of the wagon. Finally a man seized its bridle and managed to lodge the runaway on a telegraph pole in front of the Boston Five-and-ten Cent Store.

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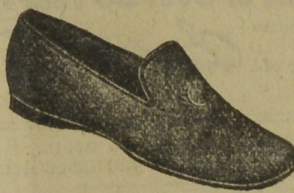
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
