ENGLAND CASE PRESENTS FEATURES OF GREAT INTEREST

Dr. G. W. Bailey Said All Prescriptions Shown Him Were Forgeries—Mackay Told of Borrowing Prescription Blanks for England Saying They Were for Dr. Bailey—Got Five "Pers" in All—Case Goes Over Till Friday.

This morning E. W. England, resident of Boston and ex-member of the 236th MacLean Highlanders, appeared before Magistrate Limerick for his preliminary hearing on a charge of unlawfully forging prescriptions for intoxicating liquor. P. J. Hughes appeared for the prosecution and R. B. Hanson, K. C. for the defence. The information in this case was laid by Sub-Inspector Fraser Saunders.

Bald-Headed Man

The first witness called by the prosecution was a man by name of MacKay, who was born and lived for some time at Hayesville and is at present residing at Fredericton Junction where he has a farm. He is a returned soldier, having returned to this country a year ago last March. He told of getting a prescription from England and getting it filled at a local drug store which he found rather difficult to describe, except that it had a bald-headed man in it. On his return to the Waverly Hotel where they were staying England told him that he had run out of blanks and asked him if he would go and get him some. Witness said that he went to the home of a doctor, Dr. Holden, he thought it was, and asked for some blanks for Dr. Bailey, as he had run out of them. The doctor was not at home but his wife gave the witness three or four blanks and he returned with these to England.

Wrote Prescriptions

MacKay and two others then went upstairs entered a room and slammed the door. The impact caused the knob to fall off and they were thus imprisoned in the room until England came up and kicked the door in. Witness (MacKay) then asked him if he was a doctor and he said "Yes." He then turned to his friends and said "He will write you out a prescription and save you going to anyone else." This all happened on the 18th of March. About four o'clock in the afternoon of the same day witness got two more, making a total of five, for none of which did he pay. MacKay not only helped the boys get their "pers" but he also went to a drug store and had them filled. At the same time he protested that he was not a drinking man and had no use for liquor.

Rubbing It In

In his cross-examination by Mr. Hanson? MacKay averred that "Whiskey is now the same as medicine, and is rubbed on just like liniment." When asked regarding this statement he explained, "First you pay one dollar for a per. That's rubbing it on. Then you

pay \$4.50 for a bottle of booze; that's rubbing it in. After that you take it." Before filling in the blanks he said that the prisoner asked him his name and that of his doctor, and then proceeded with the business. He also said that England told him that he did not know just exactly how to write one for ale, but would ring up the drug store and find out if he wanted it.

Dr. G. W. Bailey

Dr. Geo. W. Bailey of Fredericton Junction was the next witness called. He swore that none of the prescriptions, some eighteen of which were shown him, carried his signature and that none of the writing on them was his.

Third Witness

Hunter, one of the others who was at the hotel on March 18th was put on the stand. He said that he was present at the time and place mentioned and was in the prisoner's room. He received a paper from him and gave it to MacKay, who left the room and later returned with a bottle of whiskey.

This closed the case of the prosecution and court adjourned until Friday at 2:30 p. m.

CANADIAN EGGS COMMENDED

Toronto, April 12—With reference to the export situation, the English Grocers' Review in its annual review of the provision trades during 1919 brings American and Canadian eggs under notice together in the following statement: "Canadian eggs all round were superior in quality and size; therefore commanded a good sale right through the short season. Prices opened at about 34s to 35s in November and early in December went to 36s and 37s, finishing up the year at 38s 6d. to 40s. Owing to their excellent quality they maintained a price well above that of Americans right through a much more satisfactory state of things than was the case last season when the Controller fixed the price of both at 40s. so that those dealers who were lucky enough to get Canadian eggs allotted to them had an advantage over their competitors, who had United States at the same price."

PUSSYFOOT IS RECALLED

Columbus O., April 11—The New York World Says. "Pussyfoot" Johnson generalissimo of the prohibition expeditionary forces now operating on the foreign front is said to be withdrawn from overseas operations temporarily. While not in the nature of a strategic retreat, the decision to pull in some of the advanced trench mortar propaganda batteries may be explained by new development on the home sector, where the amendment armies have wavered under severe anti-Volstead attacks.

This new alignment in the general staff of the dry G.H.Q. has been confirmed by a communique received at the Johnson home here from Paris heralding General Johnson's expected arrival at home on the 15th of this month.

The General expects to take the road immediately on his arrival home and carry out a concentrated lecture platform barrage for probably a year. The contemplated offensive is expected to bolster up the morale of the dry troops.

Died at St. John

Mr. James V. Russell, a well known citizen of St. John and a former city commissioner, died on Sunday after an illness of two years brought on by a stroke of paralysis. He was 57 years of age and is survived by a family of one son and one daughter. He also leaves three brothers, David of Toronto, William of Vancouver and John President of the Canadian Drug Co. St. John, and two sisters Mrs. Eustace Barnes and Mrs. Robert S. Ritchie, both of St. John.

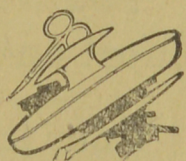
