

### Favor June Election

St. John Globe: At a meeting held in the Centenary Methodist Church on Thursday the following resolution was passed. ## FALCONS ARE FAVORITES OVER YANKS

The Canadian Olympic Hockey Team Does Not Check Hard, However—Expected to Win.

Toronto, April 11—With the 1919-20 hockey season a thing of the past followers of the great winter pastime have turned their attention towards the Olympic Games series which will be played in Belgium between April 20 and 30. This will be the first hockey series ever played with the world's championship at stake, and for this reason great interest is being taken in it, not only in Canada and the United States, but also in some of the European countries.

Falcons of Winnipeg, who will represent Canada are odds on favorites to win; in fact, the majority of Canadian fans are so confident of the result that they do not take the pretensions of the United States teams seriously. Falcons established a splendid record this year when they lost but two games in fourteen, and on form should decisively defeat the American representatives. Much, however, depends on the tactics adopted by the U. S. team. Several of their players notably "Larry" McCormick and "Herb" Drury are very aggressive and in case they elect to take full advantage of the rule permitting body checking they may stop the title march of the Winnipeg Hawks. Falcons showed in the final game against University of Toronto that with them bodychecking is a lost art. They play the puck and not the man.

### Uncle Sam's Gain

Until January of this season the American teams played seven-man hockey and for this reason they will probably have a slight advantage in the Olympic Games seven-man series over Falcons, who have become accustomed to the abbreviated style. The latter however have the advantage of having played together, while Uncle Sam pins his faith on an all-star team.

Canadian critics should not let the results of exhibition games played at Pittsburgh convince them of the strength of the United States Olympic team. The ice surface at Duquesne Garden is two hundred and eighty-five feet long and good hockey there is out of the question. It is impossible to judge the relative merits of the teams under such conditions. Another phase that causes consternation in both camps is the incapability of the referees. Visiting teams have been complaining all season against the ridiculous decisions of the officials, and strange to say the Pittsburgh players are of the same opinion. Captain Eddie Nagle of the P. A. A. team stated that there was not a capable official in the Smoky City.

"Ray" Bonney, goalkeeper of the U. S. septette, is one of the best in the sport. He played in the Ottawa City League and later in the Cobalt Mines League where for several years he starred for Cobalt Lake. Bonney had a disagreement with the P.A.A. management earlier in the present season, and retired, but about six weeks ago he was prevailed upon to rejoin his teammates. The Toronto N. H. L. club tried unsuccessfully to lure Bonney away from amateur ranks. He holds a good position with Spalding & Co. in Pittsburgh.

### The Man to Watch

In "Joe" McCormick at right wing the Americans claim one of the best players in his position to be found anywhere. He was born in Buckingham, and is now twenty-four years of age. He played in the Miner League several years ago and was regarded as the best wing player in the North country. McCormick is a splendid skater, a brilliant backchecker and probably boasts the most accurate shot of any man in the sport. In six successive games at Pittsburgh this season he either forced the goaler to save or landed the puck in the net every time he shot. Falcons plan to play Goodman at rover and Woodman at left wing. If they follow this policy they can rest assured that McCormick will run wild in the series.

"Herb" Drury is another of the U.S. team who needs no introduction to Canadian fans. He is a native of Midland, and until "Mike" Goodman flashed across the horizon, was hailed as the fastest skater in hockey. These two speed merchants will play the rover positions at Antwerp, and the battle should be a thrilling one. Drury is a mighty useful hockeyist, and this despite the fact that he is a selfish attacker.

### Where Yanks Fail

If the remaining players on the Yankee team were as good as McCormick, Bonney and Drury Canadian fans would have occasion to be anxious in Falcon's behalf. Such, however is not the case and the Maple Leaf team should win.

## JIMMY WILDE WILL BOY AT TORONTO IN MAY

Will Appear at the Queen City on Victoria Day—Appears at Windsor, Ontario, Tonight.

Windsor Ont., April 11—Sergt. Jimmy Wilde, Britain's wizard of the ring was welcomed here today by a delegation of the Army and Navy Veterans' Association, under whose auspices he will box in the Windsor Armories next Monday night. Wilde announced his intention of remaining in Canada until the end of May, and stated that he had consented to box in Toronto on May 24th.

## BALL PLAYERS UNION AGAIN

Columbia, S. C., April 11—Baseball soon may see the formation of a new union of players patterned after the old players' Fraternity, but with much more radical tendencies than the organization which formerly was presided over by Dave Fultz, now president of the International League.

There is a spirit of unrest among the players today that is noticeable in almost every camp. The players in many camps are not submitting to discipline the way they used to. The same feeling of dissatisfaction that is so much in evidence in the labor world is running rampant in baseball.

## JOHNSON TO BOX IN MEXICO

Los Angeles, April 11—Jack Johnson, formerly heavyweight champion now at Tijuana, Lower California will be given an early match either at Tijuana or Mexicali, according to Tom Jones who announced here today he had been engaged as matchmaker by the Dato brothers, sport promoters and brothers-in-law of Gov. Esteban Cantu of Lower California.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

Under Sub-Section 2 of Section 73 of the Highway Act 1914 no motor vehicle is allowed on any highway of the Province in the Spring of the year while the frost is coming out of the ground, without permission of the Supervisor, with the exception of physicians, clergymen and ambulance drivers. Sub-section 1 of the same section of the Act forbids the carrying of loads over 3000 pounds and the hauling of portable mills on wheels between the fifteenth day of March and the fifteenth day of May, in any year, without a written permit from the Supervisor of Roads. This notice will remain in force until the Supervisor is satisfied that the road is fit for motor traffic, as applied to sub-section 2, and until arrangement be made with the Supervisor in compliance with the Act, as applied to sub-section 1.


