

## MEETING OF VOCATIONAL EDUCATION BD.

DOMINION DIRECTOR TO CONFER WITH THAT BODY

Amendments to Vocational Education Act will be Considered—L. W. Gill of Ottawa Here.

The Vocational Education Board of New Brunswick will meet at 10.30 Tuesday morning at the Education Office here. L. W. Gill of Ottawa Director of Technical Education for the Dominion will attend the meeting. The principal business to come before the Board will be consideration of amendments to the Vocational Education Act which will be necessary because of aid granted by the Dominion. Mr. Gill also will address the Board giving a report upon conditions and making some suggestions. He arrived in Fredericton this morning and has recovered from a minor operation which he underwent recently at St. John.

The amount of the grant for Vocational Education in the various Provinces made by the Dominion is determined on a basis of population. The amount which New Brunswick will spend this year is not determined however as Vocational Education has not been completely organized in this Province yet. It will be some time before the Province will be in a position to use its entire grant.

A wrecking train was afterwards sent out from Fredericton.

## BIG ICE JAM ATTRACTED MANY VISITORS

SLIGHT MOVEMENT OF ICE DURING THE WEEK-END

Motion Picture Men Warned to be on the Alert—Criticism of Railway Location.

The great ice jam nine miles west of Fredericton is still holding and the conditions in the St. John River today are reported as showing little change. Cool weather made the water drop slightly, but it rose again. During the week-end there were several slight movements of the ice here and at the lower end of the jam but there is still no sign of the ice running out. The tributaries of the St. John in this section are now clear of ice. There is a little open water below the railway bridge.

Motion picture photographers who are anxious to obtain photographs of the ice run have been notified to be on hand this week as it is expected that the ice cannot stay much longer.

### Many Visited Jam.

Sunday many visited the banks of the river in the vicinity of the big jam which is estimated as eighteen miles long and the greatest which has occurred on the St. John river within memory.

The bed of the river is completely plugged on the Southern side and the only outlet appears to be on the other side of the river. Though this is not discernible the roar of the water racing through can be heard for a long distance. It now seems quite probable that the jam will hold until the ice is so rotted away by the current that it will not be as dangerous as at first supposed.

### Poor Railway Location.

The fact that the Canadian National Railways is compelled to transfer mails and passengers a distance of some two miles around a section of the line of the St. John and Quebec Railway which is covered by water and ice, has caused much unfavorable comment on the part of railway men and others that such a location for the line was selected. An expensive right of way through intervalle land of high agricultural value was secured when the line was built. This is now covered by water and blocks of ice as a result of the big jam. At other places on the line trains actually have gone through six inches of mud which was carried over the rails by water.

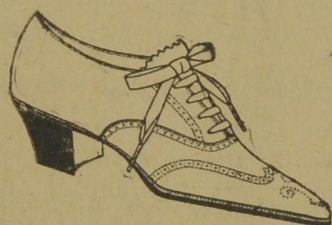
