## OUR WATER POWERS

The utilization of water-power in Canada is advancing even more rapidly than heretofore. During 1919, the installation of plants with a total of 64,400 h.p. was completed in various portions of the Dominion; the developments at present under construction or in process of installation aggregate over 370,000 h.p. Other projects definitely contemplated for the near future will add 750,000 h.p.

Among the more notable developments are the 200,000 Chipawa plant of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission, now under construction, to utilize the full head of Niagara power, and the impetus given by the Quebec Government to the conservation of water by storage. Much activity is also to be noted in the Maritime Provinces.

This rapid progress which represents industrial growth of the most valuable character, should be encouraged yet most carefully guided. In the United States, electrical installations have doubled every five years while, in Canada, the present hydro-electric installation is about ten times that of 1900. The present hydraulic installation in the Dominion is nearly 2,400,000 h.p. If we assume for this country only one-half the rate of increase recorded for the United States a total of 4,800,000 h.p. would be developed in 10 years, and 9,600,000 h.p. in 20 years, if available.

All will rejoice that the government of New Brunswick has made a move in the direction of water power development. Premier Foster's bill passed the House yesterday without opposition, and it is understood that steps will be taken immediately to carry out the provisions of the Act. It is one of the most important pieces of legislation ever placed on the statute books of the province.

## YORK COUNTY ROADS

Not being able to find fault with the condition of the roads in his own county Mr. B. F. Smith in the House yesterday found it necessary to usurp the functions which should be performed by the members for York. He claimed that the roads of York county were being neglected and pointed out to the Minister of Public Works that inasmuch as the capital of the province was located in York, its roads should be kept in first class condition. It is certainly very kind of the member for Carleton to show such solicitude for the affairs of York, but in so doing he is paying a rather poor compliment to the four gentlemen who sit for this county in the House. The members for the county are familiar with conditions and would certainly not have made such a bad break as to lay the blame on the Minister of Public Works for the condition of the highway roads located within the city limits. The fact of the matter is that the roads of York County, like those of the neighboring County of Carleton are being better looked after today than ever before.

A notice of a resolution requesting the Federal Government to take a plebiscite on the prohibition question was given in the Legislature yesterday by Hon. Mr. Tweeddale. Mr. Peck of Albert has consented to second the resolution. The matter will come up for discussion on Friday.

vote at Parish meeting. The report was accepted.

The report of the committee on Statistics and the state of the Church was read by Charles Coster of Woodstock. It was accepted.

### Social Service.

The report of the Social Service Committee was also read by Rev. W. H. Sampson. He said that special attention had been given to the appointment of an officer to look after the church women coming to the city. The report of Alice K. Walker, on the work of the Deaconess, was read and was also submitted by this gentleman. Miss Robinson, the Deaconess, makes between fifty and sixty visits a month and her work is considered most thorough.

Rev. J. V. Young pointed out several opportunities for social work in his own city of St. John.

### Bible Reading.

The report of the Committee on Bible Reading in the public schools was read by Very Rev. Dean Neales. He reported good progress and recommended that the committee be continued. This report was also passed.

### Increased Stipends.

The report on the committee of laymen on Increased Stipends of the clergy was read by its chairman, Horace A. Porter. The campaign has taken the form largely of circular letters. The net results for 1919 as compared with 1918 are as follows.

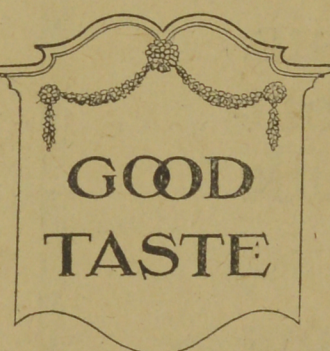
