

CONFESSED TO MURDER

Steubenville, Ohio, April 18—Harry Miller, aged 26, of Akron was held in the Jefferson County Jail here today, after having confessed publicly during a revival service last night at a little church at Beach Bottom, West Va., to the murder of eleven-year-old Frances South.

Miller went to the church altar and with his hands raised he prayed to God to have mercy on his soul for the death of the little girl. He said he found relief in telling all to God. Members of the congregation took Miller to Sheriff J. R. Litten of Brooks county, W. Va., who believes the man to be slightly demented. The Sheriff said that in the night Miller insisted upon making a full confession to him. He said Miller confessed to beating the South girl over the head with a revolver at a lonely spot near her home at Adena, Ohio. He told the Sheriff he killed the girl because of something she had said while he was visiting her sister.

PARLIAMENT IN OVERALLS A PROBABILITY

Ottawa, April 20—Parliament in overalls is not an immediate probability though "They do say" that Isaac Ellis Pedlow, Liberal member for South Renfrew has dared John Flaws Reid, member for MacKenzie to brave the speaker's eye in denim. The Saskatchewan member has not absolutely refused to pick up the glove thus thrown down, pointing out that farmers know how to wear them and still feel at their ease. David Loughnan, editor of the Veteran, the official organ of the G. W. V. A., will be among the prominent members of the organization to follow the example of the Dominion executive officers. He also will appear at his office tomorrow clad in a brand new suit of "working clothes."

Woodstock, April 19—James Kirkpatrick of East Zorra had a narrow escape from death yesterday when he was buried under a mass of ensilage nearly six feet deep. THE HUDSON BAY COMPANY TO OBSERVE ANNIVERSARY

Winnipeg, Man., April 17—With Indian fur brigades and York boats loaded with peltries on Red river, council fires burning at Lower Fort Garry and the smoke of the peace pipe scenting the air, the romance of wilderness days will live again at the celebration of the 250th anniversary of the Hudson's Bay company which will be inaugurated in Winnipeg May 2.

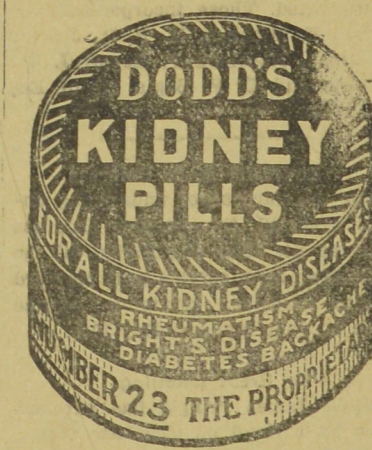
Sir Robert Kindersley, G. B. E., latest of the distinguished line of Hudson's Bay company governors that began with Prince Rupert, valiant champion of the house of Stuart in the Cromwellian wars, will come from England and take part in the river pageant and in the subsequent street pageants which will be held successively in Edmonton, Calgary, Vancouver and Victoria.

The Red river pageant which promises to be one of the most interesting historical spectacle ever staged in Canada, will start from the site of old Fort Garry, early capital of the company's once vast empire and about which Winnipeg grew, and pass down stream eighteen miles to Lower Fort Garry. Tricked out in bravery of paint feathers and beaded buckskin, Indians from a dozen tribes will man York boats and canoes in fur brigade formation. To do honor to the company to which their ancestors paid loyal allegiance, Crees will come from the shores of Hudson Bay; Swampy Crees from James Bay; Ojibways from the Lake Superior fur country; Plain Crees from northern Saskatchewan; Blackfeet, Piegiens and Assiniboines from the prairies and the Rock mountains; and tribesmen from the Athabasca and British Columbia.
