

## BUSINESS ACTIVITIES ARE BRISK

### THREE NEW COMPANIES, THREE PARTNERSHIPS

Masons at Moncton and K. of C. Edmondson are Incorporated—New Lumber Company.

The Royal Gazette today contains notice of the incorporation of three companies and of the formation of three partnerships, indicating that commercial activities continue to be brisk in the Province.

#### Partnerships.

Arthur Melanson and Herman Comau, both of the Town of Bathurst, have entered into partnership under the name and style of The Bathurst Gager Ale Works, and will carry on business as manufacturers and dealers in kecream, confectionery, aerated waters, etc.

Henry C. Read of Sackville Herbert W. Read of Stonehaven, Arthur E. Smith of Bathurst and Horatio M. Mitton of Bathurst have formed a partnership under the name of Read, Smith & Mitton to carry on a lumber business at Upsalquitch, Restigouche County.

Allen Wortman of Upper Kent, Carleton County and William H. Gaunce of the same place have formed a partnership under the name of Wortman & Gaunce to carry on a meat and grocery business formerly carried on by Allen Wortman.

Moncton Masconic Temple, Ltd., with capital stock of \$99,000 and head office at the City of Moncton has been incorporated.

#### May Come Up in House

The bill to permit Dr. Gerard of this city the right to practice his profession of dentistry was killed by the law committee of the House yesterday. It is said today that an effort will be made to bring the matter up in the House.

#### Hotel Accomodations Overtaxed.

The hotels of the City are doing the best business which they have done in some time although the period of the legislative session always brings many people to Fredericton. Accommodations are overtaxed and the hotels are lodging guests about the city whenever possible.

#### Auto Caught Fire.

An auto caught fire in King street, just below Carleton shortly after ten o'clock this morning. The front seat and rubber mats came out decidedly the worse but the car otherwise suffered little damage. A few pails of water from a nearby house put out the blaze. In the meanwhile the motor-truck was summoned but was not needed.

#### Mid-week Country Market.

There was a good sized mid-week country market at Phoenix Square this morning. Produce was offered in fair quantities with prices showing little change. Prices ruled as follows: Veal 12 to 20 cents per pound; butter, 60 to 65 cents per pound; eggs, 65 cents per dozen; maple honey, 75 per bottle; maple sugar, 50 cents per pound; potatoes, \$9.00 per barrel.

## KING'S COLLEGE THE TOPIC AT ANGLICAN SYNOD THIS MORNING

M. G. Teed Directed Criticism Toward Reference in Bishop's Charge to Federation With Dalhousie University—Bishop Replied—Impression That Teachings of That College Lean Toward Rome Rather Than Geneva Alleged.

The Diocesan Synod continued this morning. The report of the Governors of Kings College was read by Canon Smithers, dealing with the history and value of the institution. The value of the property at Windsor is at present of the value of \$300,000. The insurance on the property destroyed was \$48,000.

This report was adopted.

#### Rev. Dr. Boyle

Rev. Dr. Boyle, the President of King's College addressed the Synod. With regard to the college he advocated the building of a brick building modern and up to date, in every way. Speaking on the academic work during the last year he said that they had the largest registration, biggest freshman class and largest number of women students in the history of the institution. At present the college is practically out of debt whereas five years ago it was heavily indebted.

He touched on the subject of federation and said that he himself was favorable to the scheme, if it could be done without the loss of dignity and prestige.

Both Dalhousie and King's agreed that amalgamation would not be practicable and both withdrew from the conference.

King's College is and has been a challenge and appeal to Anglicans in this province; the past blunders are steadily being overcome and the future is very bright. Dr. Boyle emphasized the fact that as long as he was spared the policy of economy would be continued.

#### M. G. Teed

Dr. M. G. Teed, the Chancellor of King's was the next speaker. "Are the clergy broad enough to put their hands to the plough and help?" he asked. He said that the feeling was that the clergy were not doing their bit in this way and asked that they lead the way. Would they do this, he said, there would be no trouble in raising all the funds necessary among the laity. He criticized the statement by Bishop Richardson in his charge that King's College was a Nova Scotia college and declared that it was poor advertising to use the canvass for money for the rebuilding.

Dr. Teed remarked on the fact that

many Anglican young men were at fonal institutions and said that this condition should be remedied. At the close of his remarks he was heartily applauded.

Rev. Mr. Richards replied in part to Dr. Teed's indictment of the clergy. He agreed but thought that his words should apply first to old King's men.

#### Rev. Dr. Campbell

Rev. Dr. Campbell, of Hampton, the oldest member of the Fredericton Diocese, declared that there was not a lack of unity in the Clergy in the province, but of the laity.

#### Leaning Toward Rome

Rev. M. H. Hamilton-Brown said that possibly one reason that the evangelical party of the Church of England did not support King's College was that it thought that teachings there tended rather towards Rome than Geneva. However he said that this was not right, but that all parties should stand united in the support of the institution.

Rev. Canon Kuhring of St. John asked some very pertinent questions regarding the present situation in New Brunswick.

#### Dean Neales

Very Rev. Dean Neales wished to deprecate any criticism of His Lordship's charge to the Synod. He also thought that parties in the Church should be deprecated altogether and all are united even though they do not think exactly alike in many inessential things.

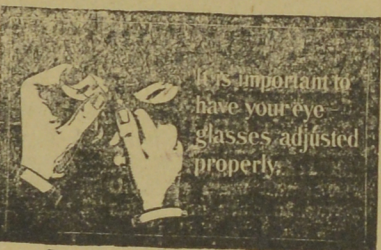
The oldest graduate of King's Rev. W. B. Armstrong of St. John who graduated in 1863, addressed the gathering. He emphasized the fact introduced by Dean Neales that the smaller universities supply a better training than the larger ones.

#### Bishop Richardson

His Lordship Bishop Richardson in replying to the criticism of Dr. Teed of the charge to the Synod asked that the Synod weigh carefully all things considering the fact that all bishops in both Nova Scotia and New Brunswick have been similarly accused of being lukewarm in their feeling toward King's College. He stated that he believed in a small college with a big atmosphere, where students got
