OVERCONFIDENCE SPOILED U.N.B.'S HOCKEY CHANCES

Defeat at Moncton Puts Team Out of the Running—Team will be Almost Intact Next Year.

The chances of the University of New Brunswick for the intercollegiate hockey title of the Maritime Provinces went by the board at Moncton last night when Acadia defeated the Red and Black team 7 to 1 in the play off for the Western Intercollegiate League. Acadia will now play off with St. Francis Xavier for the Maritime college title, St. F. X. having beaten King's College 10 to 4 at Stellarton in the play-off for the Eastern Intercollegiate League.

Overconfidence the Trouble

The chances of the U.N.B. to land the Maritime college hockey title never were better than they were this year. Overconfidence was the trouble. It is quite true that the local college had no second string players of sufficient ability to furnish subs for the games but no U. N. B. team ever came back off tour with two league victories to its credit and went into its last game of the series with three victories and no defeats. Everyone expected U.N.B. to beat Acadia here and by all expectations it should have. The players expected to also and that made the trouble. In the playoff at Moncton the team had an uphill fight with Fleet the centre, sick and no man who could be worked in.

Lesson Must be Learned

The lesson of playing until end of the game and until the end of the season must be learned by U. N. B. This is not the first instance of the Red and Black losing at the eleventh hour when by all indications it had a championship team. The Rugby season of 1919 was very similar. It is probable however that the provincial university will start with the fag-end of this hockey season to prepare for that of 1921. The errors of this disastrous season can be of value.

To Nurses—The city is suffering from lack of nurses. Please volunteer for service at \$6 a day or 75c. a hour. Persons with practical experience in nursing will be paid \$4 a day or 50c. an hour.

To physicians—Whenever it may be done safely, please urge your patients not to demand a trained nurse. Leave every trained nurse possible for work among the poor.

To clergymen—Advise your congregations about dangers from coughing or sneezing without covering the face with a handkerchief. Persons who find it impossible to refrain from coughing or sneezing should remain at home. Tell the congregation to avoid fear and to practice the ordinary rules of the simple life.

To the public—Observe the rules of simple living. If feverish or otherwise ill, go to bed and call a physician the well.

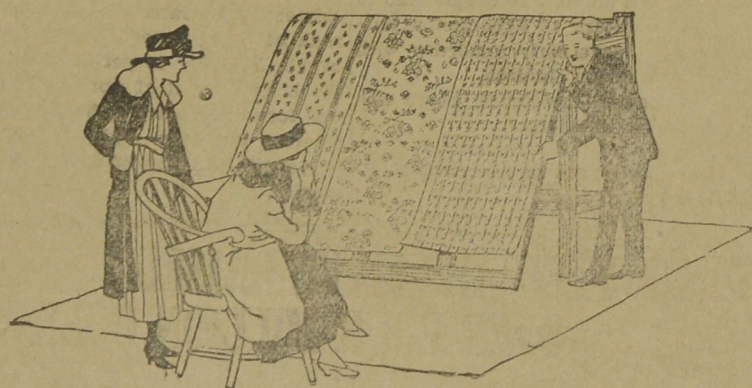
