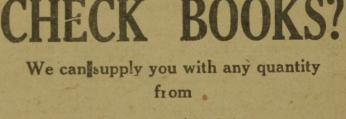

No survey was made of districts having valuations of more than \$100,-000, as the minimum salaries now paid in those districts are as high or higher than the minimum recommended by

your committee. There are districts paying as high as \$7 on the \$100 school taxes and those paying 15 cents on the \$100. The highest and lowest rates are of-ten found in the same parish. There are school districts in the Province with a valuation of \$1000. and a num-ter of district having a valuation of ber of districts having a valuation of less than \$5000.

Assessment values very greatly in the different Parishes and Counties. Some districts, chiefly in cities, are assessed at full value, other districts varying from two thirds to one quar-ter.

Some poor districts employ teach ers of higher classes and maintain excellent schools, while some wealthy

districts employ cheap teachers and maintain poor schools. Under these conditions, it is well night impossible to standardize teach-ers' salaries according to district val-uations

Such inequalities as have been pointed out in rates of taxation and modes of assessment do not provide equal opportunities for pupils nor equal burdens for ratepayers.
