If the skirt is not draped it is sure to show plaiting in some form.

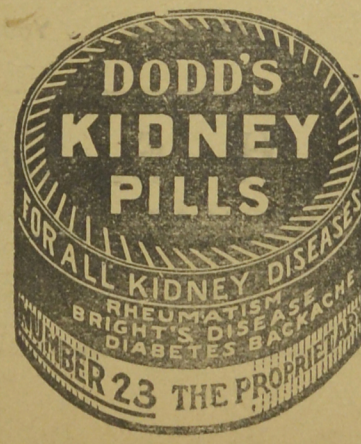
Some evening gowns are showing tiny puffs or lace caps for sleeves.

COMMITTEE ON TEACHERS' SALARIES

(Continued From Page Three). Cases of hardship, will go a long way to enable the richer to help the poorer districts. Property accumulates in the cities, towns and villages, at the expense very often of the country districts, some of which have become deserted and others have extreme difficulty to provide school privileges. Many people leave their farms in order to obtain the better educational facilities to be secured in the graded schools of the towns. An increase in the County Fund is a fair and just method of equalizing the burdens of taxation, by distributing them over a wider area.

At present (Sec. 44, Sch. Man.) the County assessment for schools is a sum equal to 30 cents per head of population according to the last census, imposed upon the property of each County. After deducting \$150 per head for the education of the deaf and blind pupils in each the balance

is distributed twice each year on requisition made by the Chief Superintendent of Education upon the County Secretaries. Thirty dollars is paid each district employing a teacher, and the balance distributed among districts maintaining schools according to the proportion the grand total days' attendance of each district bears to the grand total days' attendance for the County. This fund is collected and paid out by the County Officers.

The future welfare of this Province depends upon its teachers and schools more than upon any other agency. Salaries should be high enough not only to reward training and competency. It is also necessary that we should be able to meet the competition of others for our best teachers. At the present time all branches of unskilled labor are paid more than many of our trained teachers.

Your Committee would take this occasion to recommend that legislation be enacted giving any Parish the option of voting upon the desirability of establishing a Parish School Board in the place of the Present District School Boards. This would enable larger salaries to be paid teachers, because the burden of taxation would be distributed over wider areas, and the poorer districts would be better able to support a better class of schools.

NOTICE OF LEGISLATION.

Public notice is hereby given that application will be made at the next session of the Legislative Assembly, by the City of Fredericton, for the passage of a bill or bills for the following purposes:

(a) To amend the City of Fredericton Assessment Act, 1907, and in particular section 46 thereof, so as to provide that tax notices may be mailed to ratepayers or delivered personally, as the City Treasurer may decide, under the direction of the Finance Committee.

(b) That the said Assessment Act be further amended so as to provide that all females assessed on income or property, real or personal, within the City of Fredericton, and who shall have paid their taxes within the time limited thereby by the said Act, shall be entitled to vote at City elections.

(c) For authority to make a grant for a Memorial in memory of soldiers who lost their lives during the Great War, either by way of assessment or by borrowing, as the City Council may decide.

(d) For authority to grant to the John Palmer Company, Limited, exemption from taxation for a period of twenty years from and including the year 1920; free sewerage for the same period of time under such limitation as the City Council may decide, and water for all purposes at the fixed rate of ten cents per thousand gallons, for the said period of twenty years.

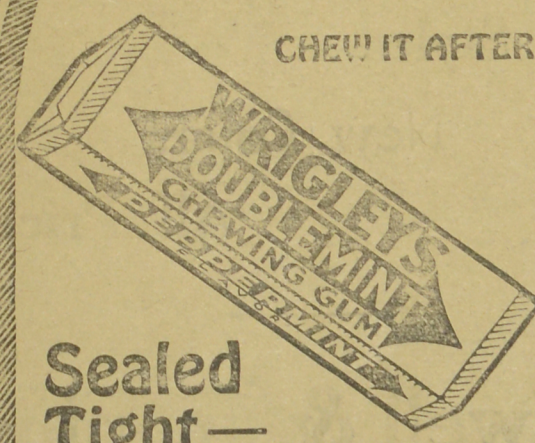

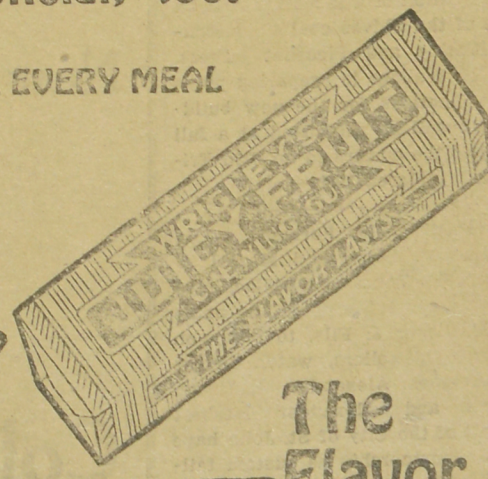
