There was a large attendance of members and a most enjoyable night was spent. Scottish songs and readings were heard and Piper Cromwell of St. John furnished bagpipe music and also danced Scottish dances and entertained by juggling. In addition there was a toast-list of some length, also addresses upon Scottish subjects.

The Toast List

"The King" proposed by the President, Prof. A. Cameron, was responded to by the National Anthem.

"The Day and A' Wha Honor It" was proposed by Hon. O. S. Crockett, Past President, and responded to by the singing of "Scots Wha Hae."
"The men who fought Overseas," was proposed by Hon. O. S. Crockett and responded to by Col. Montgomery Campbell, Major W. R. Caldwell, Major James Pringle, Capt. John S. Scott and Alfred MacNeill.

Addresses Heard.

Short addresses upon Scottish subjects were delivered. Prof. A. Cameron spoke upon Robert Burns, Scotland's great poet, giving a most interesting and instructive oration. Hon. O. S. Crockett, Past President spoke upon the history of the Fredericton Society of St. Andrew telling of its origin in 1825 and tracing its development to the present date.

Solos were sung during the evening by Ald. F. L. Cooper, Prof. Cameron and Alfred MacNeill. There also were pipe selections and Scottish dances.

Late in the evening Major Pringle proposed a toast to the late Lt. Col. A. E. G. Mackenzie who was killed in action in France while in command of the 26th New Brunswick Battalion. The deceased was known personally to many members of the society and was well known in Fredericton through being a student at the University of New Brunswick.

GETS OXFORD DEGREE

Rhodes Scholar Completes His Course—Well Known Here.

The London Times of November 15 contains a report of degrees conferred on students at the Oxford, Eng., universities in a congregation at which Vice-Chancellor Dr. L. R. Farnell, rector of Exeter College, presided.

Among those who received their degrees were Arthur N. Carter, who was a Rhodes Scholar from the University of New Brunswick in 1913, and went to University College at Oxford in the fall of that year and began the study of law. After an intermission of nearly five years, due to service at the front, Mr. Carter resumed his studies in January, 1919, and passed his final examinations with honor and distinction in last June. After spending the summer term in a further course in Northern France, Mr. Carter returned to Oxford for further work until November, when along with many others he received his degrees of Master of Arts and Bachelor of Civil Law.

He expects to sail for Saint John on the S. S. Minnedosa on December 3, and will remain for some time at least with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Carter of Fairvale.

Before leaving England he will probably meet his younger brother, George who with others in the C. P. R. passenger service sailed from Quebec on the S. S. Empress of France on last Saturday night and expects to arrive in Liverpool at the end of this week.

A. N. Carter is a son of E. S. Carter of Rothesay and attended Fredericton High School and the University of New Brunswick.
