The company is incorporated for the purpose of carrying on a lumbering business in all its branches.

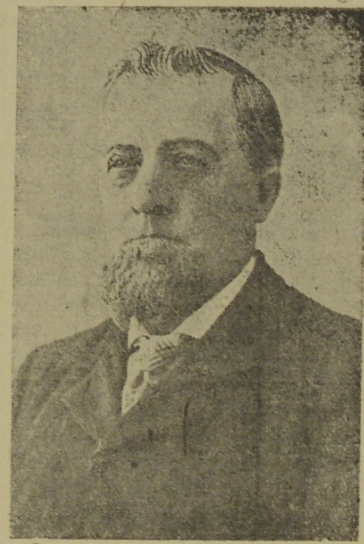
Did Not Recognize the Colors

JOHN KILBURN OBSERVED HIS 78TH BIRTHDAY

MR. KILBURN A SPLENDID TYPE OF CITIZEN

**Has Done Much for Industrial
Development Here—A Long
and Successful Business Career.**

Mr. John Kilburn, the well known retired lumberman of this city, is today observing his seventy-eighth birthday and is receiving the hearty congratulations of many friends and relatives. It is a cause of sincere regret on the part of Mr. Kilburn's friends and citizens generally that he is not in the enjoyment of good health. Two years ago he suffered a severe stroke of paralysis which partially deprived him of the power of speech and rendered him almost a helpless invalid. A vigorous constitution, however has stood him in good stead and during the past

summer and fall he was able to take frequent auto drives which he greatly enjoyed. His general health is good and while he is unable to move about with his old time activity, he maintains a cheerful demeanor and takes a keen interest in all that is going on.

Mr. Kilburn was born in the Parish of Kingsclear and the greater part of his life was spent in that parish. For upwards of forty years he carried on successful lumbering operations on the Upper St. John waters, employing a large force of men and cutting annually from five to ten million feet of logs. He visited his camps many times each season, and in the spring personally took charge of his stream driving operations. He continued in active business almost up to the time he was taken ill two years ago.

The City of Fredericton owes much to Mr. Kilburn for the important part he has played in the industrial development of the city. In conjunction

MAYOR HEARS PROTEST RE CRAWFORD

SAID IT SEEMED SLIGHTLY AHEAD OF TIME

**If Sedition Has Been Uttered,
Higher Authority Should be
Urged to Act—Public
Meeting.**

His Worship Mayor J. A. Reid was waited upon in the City Council Chamber at noon today by a delegation composed of a committee selected at a public meeting last night and others interested in the matter and received a protest against Lindsay Crawford being permitted to address a meeting or meetings in the City of Fredericton in connection with the Self Determination for Ireland League.

Replying to the addresses made by members of the delegation and to the resolution presented by it His Worship said that he had not had time to consider the matter placed before him. However it appeared to him that the request of the delegation was slightly ahead of time. He could not see that he could take any action until a meeting to be addressed by Crawford were advertised. As far as his newspaper The Statesman was concerned he (Reid) had seen it and had read one copy. If statements in that publication were so extreme, the delegation should go for action to a higher authority than the Mayor of Fredericton. He could assure the delegation, however, that if the occasion should arise he would take all steps necessary to put the man in his place should a meeting be held in Fredericton. He also would do his utmost to prevent seditious utterances and attacks upon the Empire and King.

It was announced this morning that Lindsay Crawford was not coming to Fredericton and had informed officials of the Self Determination for Ireland League in this city that he would come only on the invitation of a number of Protestant citizens who might be de-

All classes of citizens will join heartily with The Mail in extending to Mr. Kilburn their best wishes on the 78th anniversary of his birth.

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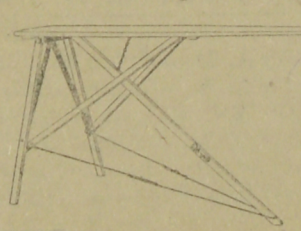
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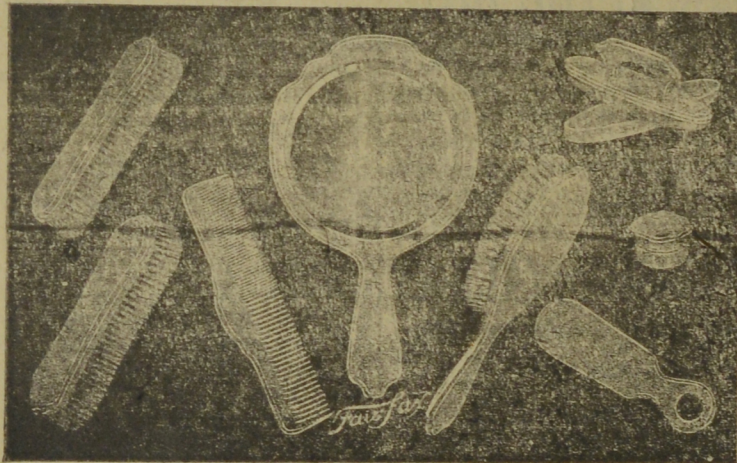
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
