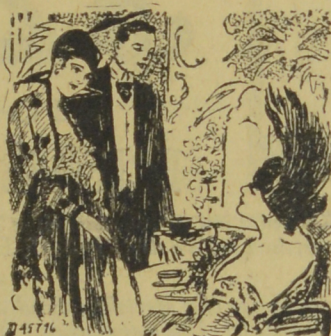

KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS HEARD  
APPROPRIATE SERMON; GRAVES  
OF DEPARTED KNIGHTS DECORATED

Pythians of Fredericton and Vicinity Attended Divine Service

at Fredericton Methodist Church Sunday Morning —  
"True Measure of Knightly Life" the Subject of Excellent  
Discourse by Rev. G. M. Young — Music by Band Composed of Members of the Order.

Members of the Knights of Pythias in Fredericton and Marysville attended divine service at the Fredericton Methodist Church Sunday morning and also decorated the graves of departed preachers and delivered a most instructive sermon. A large number of members of the Pythian Order turned out including many of the Uniform Rank and made an excellent appearance on the march. Music was furnished by a band composed of members of the Order.

The pastor of the Fredericton Methodist Church, Rev. G. M. Young, was the preacher and delivered a most instructive and appropriate sermon upon the subject "The True Measure of a Knightly Life" taking as his text Ephesians 4:13.

## Introductory Remarks.

In introduction Rev. Mr. Young stated that he took great pleasure in welcoming the Knights of Pythias to his church. He was not a member of the Order which probably was his loss, but he recognized that the organization was founded upon the principles of Christianity and occupied a prominent place in the social fabric. Its foundation was upon Friendship, Charity and Benevolence. It stood as one of the stabilizing influences in the trying period through which the world was passing.

## The Measure of a Man.

The "full measure of a man" was what all would like to attain. There was a great gulf between the product of Christian civilization and man in his primeval brute state. There were heights of development which still could be reached, or at least that was what all liked to believe.

## Various Standards.

There were various standards of the full measure of man which had been recognized at various times. He once was thought of as a victim, as the object of the hostility of spirits, gods and forces of evil. Even in the present there was a survival of that belief which placed man in the position of an object of the influence of his environment and nothing more. "What must be will be," often was proclaimed as the great ruling principle of life. It was a long time, however, since man saw that he need not be a poor shuddering victim but rather a master, and since that time he had been making himself at home among titanic forces.

## As a Fighter.

Once there was a belief that the greatest fighter was the greatest man, that ability to overcome others was the standard of true manhood. The belief survived. In recent years there was plain evidence that the hearts of fair ladies could be stirred by the passage of uniformed troops and men were known to pay more for the privilege of witnessing a prize-fight than for any other form of amusement. The standard was not a true one. The sword must be beaten into a ploughshare before real progress could be made. There was not enough steel to make swords and other implements as well. Ten years ago a few dreamers spoke of a League of Nations as the final resort in disputes between nations and peoples. Today that was beyond the dreamers and in the hands of practical statesmen who would do their best to make it a fact. The standard of man as a fighter and conqueror was past. When France voted upon the most famous Frenchman nine million votes were cast and it was Pasteur the scientist and the savior of life who was selected and not Napoleon the soldier who had caused the death of a million men.

## As a Wealth-Producer.

Many regarded as the greatest man him who was able to produce of acquire honestly the greatest wealth. They measured men in terms of money. Desire for money was the root of many things in the present stage of the world's development—things both mean and admirable. The spirit of greed had been responsible for some of the lowest crimes in history. He had heard a prominent lecturer advance the claim that it was economic conditions and not men or events, which governed history. This was a arguing along the same line. True it was that the idea of the man who could acquire great wealth appealed to many and the charge of insincerity often could be brought against those who spoke against money-making, nevertheless, the standard was not satisfactory. The worth of a man depended upon his personality and the growth he attains in its development.

## Intellectual Attainment.

Many urged that it was not in mus-

cle and not in length of sword or of bank account that the true measure of a man lay but in the extent of his intellect. The writer whose intellect was recognized as great could influence millions and indeed generations unborn. The works of Shakespeare, the writings of Solomon, Isaiah, Moses and others showed that.

## The True Standard.

In not one of these alone could the true standard of man be found. What were the words of the Lord himself? Man reached his true greatness through his competence and willingness to serve others. That was what had been said and done by the Most Knightly Man who ever lived, one who put on the form of a toady one to aid others. The ultimate standard was that of usefulness. In 1809 two men were brought into the world, one in England and the other on this side of the Atlantic. One was born in a castle of wealth and to aristocratic surroundings. The other was born in a log cabin to poverty and hard toil and the humblest of people. Yet both served their fellows—William Ewart Gladstone as the opportunity presented itself to him and Abraham Lincoln in the same way. When one could say "I have helped others," he would have reached the measure of a knightly life.

Yesterday's information from an authentic source is not surprising in view of the fact that Arthur Wright Chaplin's attorney, soon after Mrs. Chaplin sued, made overtures of a property settlement.

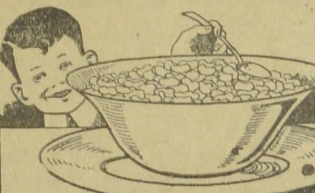
The \$125,000 which Mrs. Chaplin has refused would represent, according to attorneys, a final and undisputed settlement of community property. As an inducement to accept, it is said, Chaplin offered to make no attempt to evade service of divorce papers, as he appears recently to have been doing, by seemingly secretly going to Salt Lake City. He is now reported on his way to New York. Chaplin's going to New York, it is said is for the purpose of meeting his attorney.

In her divorce complaint Mrs. Chaplin stated the property was valued at \$1,000,000. Soon after the filing Mrs. Chaplin had issued a restraining order against her husband disposing of any property. It is thought the comedian will try to have his wife agree to threshing the divorce out in court and making a property settlement outside.

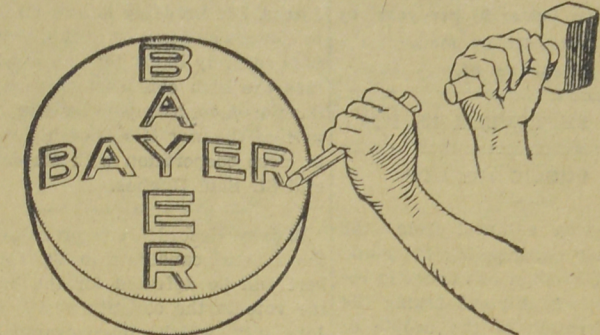
In the meantime, until Chaplin can be served with the papers, his wife's divorce suit is at a standstill.
