THE TARIFF ENQUIRY WILL BE STARTED THIS WEEK

Committee of the Cabinet, Headed by Sir Henry Drayton, is Off for Winnipeg — A Big Entourage of Newsgraphers and Stenographers — No Radical Changes in the Tariff are Contemplated.

Ottawa, Sept. 12—The cabinet committee which is to enquire into the tariff and see what ails it is off for the west. With an entourage of officials and stenographers Sir Henry Drayton and Hon. G. D. Robertson left for Winnipeg last night. When they get to the coast prior to working back Dr. Tolmie will join them and in about a fortnight Hon. J. A. Calder will be on deck. It is the first hearing of the kind since 1906 and some importance is attached to it, but not what might be expected. For the last two years an enquiry has been promised, last year it was stayed off but this time something had to be done and they are starting on it. There will be a lot of travelling a lot of publicity, a lot of expense and, numerically quite a lot of adjustments and changes but it will be a process of tinkering rather than any real or radical revision. In the last analysis it will probably be found that the basis of the National Policy has not been unholy hands laid upon the temple of protected privileges.

This summer the National Liberal and Conservative Party felt impelled to adopt a policy. It went about it with the minimum of effort and simply embraced anew the old National Policy. It is this policy which Premier Meighen is flying to the breeze with all its unvarying adherence to the principle of high protection. The party has enthusiastically adopted this cardinal doctrine and the new prime minister and his colleagues are proclaiming it up and down the country. In view of this fact the tariff inquiry now being commenced is viewed by many as largely a work of supererogation. Any changes which will be made are not at all likely to be important or to afford any material relief from the burden imposed by the protective tariff. No doubt is to be entertained that some variations will be made and a certain degree of concessions granted to the low tariff sentiment of the country but when the whole thing is cut and dried before in the adoption of the national policy, the incidental changes in minor detail are not likely to be sufficiently far-reaching as to cause either worry or injury to the favored interests. Every recent official utterance justifies this conclusion.

The Manufacturers

The manufacturers, obviously are out to hold what they have, which is a lot. They are not going to wait till the ministers get east to the manufacturing centres to present their case but, instead, will be in at the drop of the hat. It is expected to present at Winnipeg a very lengthy memorial on the principle of "hands off" and by so doing it there and then, the scheme is to counterbalance and to endeavor to neutralize the effect of the low tariff argument which will predominate in the west. Copies of the manufacturers case have been displayed here for several days and special care is being taken to ensure full publicity.

The departure of Messrs. Drayton and Robertson further diminishes the number of ministers on the job at Ottawa. The Meighen cabinet is rather given to traveling. The premier has been pretty well on the job apart from his political trips here and there, but, all summer not much above a quorum has been available. Mr. Calder is overseas supposedly looking into immigration, Mr. Guthrie who is the greatest nomad of them all is off for Europe Dr. Reid and Mr. Doherty are going there soon. Messrs. Wigmore and McCurdy are down east arranging for seating accommodation

and the help from outside the latter is enlisting is symptomatic of a panic.

Mr. Blondin leaves next week for Madrid, Mr. Ballantyne, away all summer and just back will stay a while and then, besides the premier there will be Sir George Foster, Messrs. Reid and Doherty, Sir James Loughheed, Mr. Sifton—just a quorum. It is apparent that the government is far more concerned about things on the outside than here in Ottawa and the period of suspended animation gives promise of being prolonged indefinitely.

Some Things to Face

However there are some things that must be faced. Toronto, Saskatchewan and Manitoba are all appealing from the judgment of the railway commission in the rates case and it is being put up to the government. The cabinet has the right to revise any decision of the commission on a question of fact but what will be done in this case is problematical. The government was not directly a party to the application but it knew all about it and when President Hannah sought needed revenue for the C. N. R. from the public rather than the public treasury no restraining influence was applied to him. The government lines including the G. T. R. went in with the Canadian Pacific and they have all got what they wanted. Right on the back of the judgment the ministers of railways has made a speech justifying the finding and saying a good word for the supposedly embarrassed corporations.

In view of all the facts there is little by way of hopeful prospect that the coming appeal will be productive of any material redress but, if it is not and if the public has to shoulder the millions of extra expense involved in the judgment contributory responsibility, it is pointed out, will be placed upon the government fully as much as upon the railway commission.

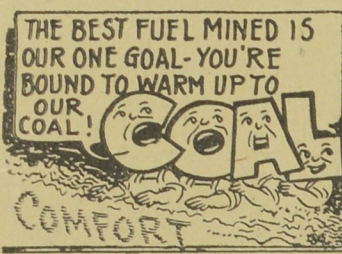
