

## SEQUEL TO ROMANCE OF CIVIL WAR

Haverhill, Dec. 20.—The Civil War romance that was recently recalled by the death of Miss Sarah Marsh Kelly was substantiated in the filing of her will for probate, as she left a bequest of \$500 to each of four nephews and a niece of Maj. Henry Jackson How, the first Haverhill man killed in the Civil War.

Maj. How was the accepted suitor of Miss Kelly and after news of his death was received in August 1862, Miss Kelly went in mourning for him and also remained single until her death. The valuation of the property left by Miss Kelly is placed at \$100,000, this including the mansion and property on Main st., that had been in the Marsh family for more than 200 years.

## MARTENS TO BE DEPORTED FROM STATES

Washington, Dec. 20.—Deportation of Ludwig C. A. K. Martens, unrecognized Soviet "Ambassador" to the United States, is ordered by Sec. Wilson. The Labor Secretary, holding that Martens is an alien, a citizen of Russia, and a member of an unorganization advocating the overthrow of the Government of the United States by force, directed the Commissioner General of Immigration to take the Bolshevik agent into custody and to deport him into Russia at the expense of the Government of the United States.

Mr. Wilson in his order added that Martens should be treated with the utmost courtesy and given the best available accommodations in transit.

Martens is expected by officials to be given leave to settle his affairs in the United States before the promulgation of the warrant of deportation.

Government officials also anticipate that an effort will be made by Martens counsel to stay the warrant by an appeal to the courts such as was done

Monday morning the papers told the story of the murder of Leon Yung, in the poolroom beneath whose windows we had been standing.

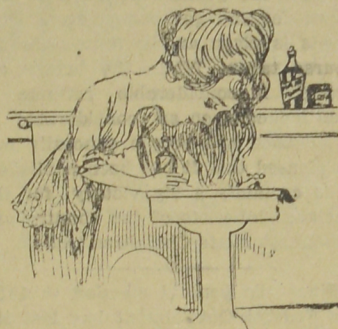

## GREAT PAPYRUS FIND IN EGYPT

Paris Dec. 20.—The "most important discovery ever made in Egypt" was announced at a meeting of the French Academy, by Professor Lacan. It was a great store of papyrus "cardboard" found underneath the temple of Der-el-Medine on the western shore of Thebes. The professor discovered an ibis cemetery, containing thousands of mummies of these sacred birds. Each bird was embedded in papyrus cardboard, and then buried in a decorated clay vase. Hundreds of thousands of papyrus, most of them with inscriptions, were used for these cardboard receptacles. The translating of the inscriptions will take years and may lead to surprising literary and historical revelations.

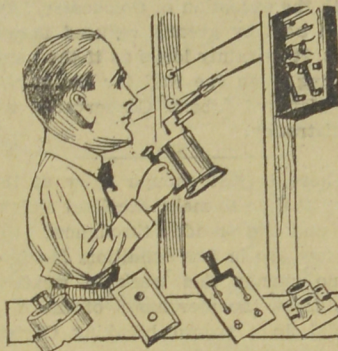

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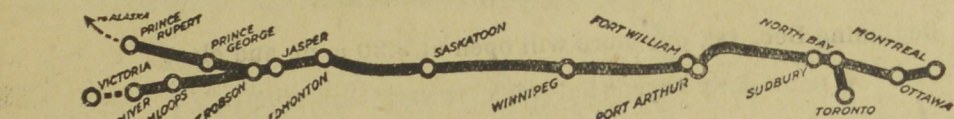
