## WILL MERGE WITH THE NEW BRUNSWICK TOURIST ASSOCIATION

The All New Brunswick Tourist, Game and Resources Association Drops Out of Existence—Work Will be Carried On by the Tourist Association With Headquarters in St. John—Government Grant to be Asked for—Will Meet in Sackville Next Year.

Dalhousie, N. B., June 17—The main business transacted at the session of the convention this morning was the decision to merge the All-New Brunswick Tourist Game and Resources League with the New Brunswick Tourist Association. Chairman C. H. Labilloy opened the meeting.

The secretary, C. B. Allan, then read his annual report. He mentioned that work of Dr. Thomas Travis of Field and Stream in advertising the province by means of articles and pictures in his magazine. The growth of membership only increased from sixty to sixty-seven paid members since last year. It was decided on account of the high cost of publication and difficulty of obtaining reliable information not to issue a new provincial booklet. The question of amalgamating with this association was not favorably considered by the Federal Tourist Association. The facilities of the association had been made use of by many tourists. He recommended that something should be done to pay the bill of \$337 due Charles Cremin incurred on the trip of Dr. Travis. He drew attention to the fact that the fish and game laws were being infringed. The trip of Irving Cobb and associates was an opportunity of much advertising satisfaction with the trip had been received.

### For Old Home Week.

H. C. Crowell had asked that New Brunswick organize a similar movement for Old Home Week, which is to be held in Nova Scotia in 1924.

A discussion of the report was commenced but action was postponed. L. P. D. Tilley M. P. P. St. John, suggested that a reliable road map of the province be added to the booklet as an aid to automobile tourists.

C. B. Allan said a letter had been received from the Fredericton association saying that that body would not amalgamate.

C. C. Avard said the vital question was to decide the status of the association before any other business was considered. He felt there should only be one association and that the office should be in St. John on account of its size and location. The All-New Brunswick Association should be merged with the New Brunswick Tourist Association, as the latter had a charter quick action was needed and the organization should be made a real force.

### Government Aid.

Hon. P. J. Veniot said that if the New Brunswick Tourist Association was recognized by the convention as the provincial body then it only will get the government aid. It was the government's policy that no branch bodies would get grants. The government received many requests for information that they would be pleased to hand over to somebody. A resolution should go on record as making the New Brunswick Tourist Association the one body.

C. C. Avard moved that the All-New Brunswick Tourist Game and Resources League be merged with the New Brunswick Tourist Association.

L. P. D. Tilley seconded the motion. P. M. Shannon thought that the name should be changed to the New Brunswick Tourist and Resources Association.

The resolution was unanimously carried after the name had been changed.

The following committees were appointed: Ways and means E. A. Schofield, chairman, J. H. B. Storer and P. M. Shannon; resolutions, R. E. Armstrong, chairman, C. C. Avard and T. H. McEvoy; nomination, W. Harry Allen, R. T. Hayes and R. H. Simonds.

At the afternoon session N. R. DesBrisay took the chair, in the absence of C. H. Labilloy. The report of the ways and means committee was received. The report recommended that a committee of three, one each from St. John, Fredericton and North Shore, be appointed to wait on the provincial government and ask for a grant of \$5,000 for the purpose of carrying on the aims of the association.

The resolutions committee reported and resolutions as follows were passed:

That a committee be appointed to revise by-laws of the association in order to provide for broadening and provincializing of its activities; that the executive of the association be requested to petition the legislature to change the name of the association to New Brunswick Tourist and Resources Association; that all communities in New Brunswick be urged to promote their attractions, beautify their surroundings and reform the sanitary

equipment of their respective localities, also to cultivate an enthusiastic boosting spirit; that the larger provincial communities be urged to form local branches to co-operate and advise with the central office operating through the local boards of trade or otherwise as they deem advisable; that provision be made in the constitution of the association for the holding of annual conventions at different points in the province so as to secure a more general interest in its objects; that a provincial tourist booklet be published by the provincial office from time to time and that arrangements be made by the executive with the Busy East magazine so as to provide for its recognition as the official organ of the association; that the thanks of the association be extended to the provincial government for the financial assistance it has extended in the past and that the government be requested to increase the provincial grant to the association so as to enable it to better attain its object; that the hearty thanks of the association be extended to W. Harry Allen and the New Brunswick Guides' Association for the assistance so willingly and effectively rendered by them in the entertainment of the National Editorial Association; that the thanks of the association be extended to the management of the C. N. R. for their courtesy and helpful co-operation in connection with the holding of the present convention; that the newspapers throughout the province be requested to devote one issue nearest to a date to be set by the executive to special articles covering the attractions and resources of its particular locality or of the province at large so as to better attract and centralize public thought in the direction of tourist development. The resolutions were unanimously adopted.

The nominating committee recommended that the present officers of the association be continued until the next annual meeting, which was adopted. It was moved and adopted that the executive of the All-New Brunswick Association be added to the executive of the New Brunswick Tourist Association.

### Next Meeting.

C. C. Avard again asked the association to meet in Sackville next year and made a motion to that effect which was carried. The date will be arranged by the executive.

C. B. Allan spoke on the question of the game laws being infringed and thought the members should back up the government officials in their duties.

Hon. P. J. Veniot felt sure the minister of lands and mines would be glad to have the co-operation of the association.

The following resolution was then passed, a copy of which will be sent to the Provincial Government: That the Association, through its Secretary, communicate with the Minister of Lands and Mines expressing its willingness to co-operate with the Department in the protection of the fish and game resources of the Province, and suggesting that educational propaganda be issued by the Department emphasizing the economical advantages resulting from the proper protection and conservation of the fish, game and other resources of the country.

The general executive was given authority to replace any of the vice-presidents of the different counties. It was decided that all requests for information should come to the central office of the association.

In the evening motion pictures of game and forest scenes were shown by Mr. W. H. Allen, and a number of resolutions were adopted.
