WELSH RABBIT.

Bread toasted on one side. One hall ound of soft cheese (mild) I table boon of butter 1/4 teaspoon salt 1/4 easpoon mustard dash of red pepper 1-3 cup of milk or cream I egg. Cut the cheese in small pieces. Melt the butter and add the cheese and sen sonings. As the cheese melts add milk gradually stirring constantly; then add egg stiffly beaten. ECONOMICAL POUND CAKE

1 cup sugar 1 cup milk. 1-3 cup buter or crisco 1 egg ¼ teaspoon salt, teaspoons baking powder, 2 cups flour, nutmeg and lemon favoring. Cream sugar and butter together Then add the beaten egg. Put baking powder and salt in the flour and add first small quantity of milk, then flour until the milk and flour are in. Beat each time you put in flour or milk and your dough will be sufficiently beaten. Bake 20 minutes.
