

DAILY EXPRESS TRAINS ON THE VALLEY LINE

SERVICE IN EFFECT ON
SUNDAY, JUNE 27TH

Will be Great Convenience to
Travelling Public — Tri-
Weekly Accommodation
to be Continued.

The long awaited daily passenger train service on the St. John & Quebec Railway under C. N. R. operation is to go into effect Sunday June 27th. This means that the first daily trains will run on the following Monday. The time-card for the new service has not yet been received but it is said that the hours of arrivals and departures at Fredericton will not be changed.

Under the new arrangement there will be an express train from St. John to Centerville and from Centerville to St. John each day.

The express from St. John will reach Fredericton at 5.30 p. m. Atlantic time and will leave for Centerville at 6 p. m. The express from Centerville will arrive here at 11 a. m. and will leave for St. John at 11.30 a. m.

Traffic on this line has increased greatly and an improved train service will result in further growth.

The accommodation trains which have alternated with the express train on Monday, Wednesdays and Fridays will continue to run on those days.

A new C. N. R. timetable will go into effect on the 27th.

Third District Meeting of the
United Baptists Closed Last
Night—Ordination Here
on Tuesday.

The annual meeting of the Third District of the United Baptist Church in New Brunswick came to a close last night at Douglas. The sessions were well attended and the meeting in general one of the most successful ever held. The arrangement for the supply of lay preachers to pastorless churches by means of vounteered motors was one of the features of the meeting. A committee which will have that in charge is composed of H. T. Brewer, E. W. Stairs, J. W. Spurden, H. P. Lint and S. J. Hallett.

Women's Session

The session Thursday afternoon was devoted entirely to the Women's Missionary Aid Society. Mrs. James Hunter, District President, was in the chair and gave the opening address. Reports of committee and local societies were received. Papers were read as follows: Mrs. C. T. Clark of Pokok on "Baby Bands", Mrs. Havelock Coy on "Mission Bands", Miss Irma Fash on "The World-wide Guild". Mrs. W. C. Keirstead gave an address in which she described conditions at conferences in India and Bolivia.

An address on mission work in India was given by Rev. J. J. Glendenning who recently returned from labors in that missionary field.

Thursday Night's Session

Thursday night's session was opened by a song service conducted by Rev. Mr. Williams, new pastor at Douglas. The district clerk Rev. C. T. Clark in a report of the Permanent Council on Ordination, recommended that the council convene at Fredericton on Tuesday afternoon next to consider the ordination of Licentiate David Jones, pastor at Macnaqua.

Resolutions Adopted

Resolutions brought in by the Committee on Resolutions were adopted as follows:

1. Concerning the death of Rev. J. G. A. Belyea who was one of the efficient ministers of the district.
2. Concerning the success of the Forward Movement Campaign which resulted in the district allotment being exceeded.

4. Concerning the Prohibition Plebiscite, July 10, all Baptist people being urged to vote for the retention of the Prohibition Act and against the sale of light wines and beer.

ALIBI TO BE ATTEMPTED IN MUNN CASE

PARENTS TO SWEAR SON
WAS NOT IN THIS CITY

J. M. Scott Identified Man Yesterday—Charge Amended to Uttering Forged Time Check.

Perley Munn, Hayesville who appeared Thursday in the police court on the charge of forging a time-check on Fraser Companies, Limited will attempt to prove an alibi by his parents who are to be in court on Monday as witnesses to which day the case stands adjourned. His parents are ready to swear that in August 1919 the accused was not in Fredericton where it is alleged by the complainant company, he presented a forged time-check to J. M. Scott and secured cash.

Evidence Taken Thursday.

Yesterday Munn appeared in the police court and pleaded not guilty to the charge of forgery and elected to be tried by the Police Magistrate.

Fred McLaggan who had been in charge of the Fraser Companies Limited business at Stanley went on the stand for the prosecution and swore that in 1919 at no time did Munn work under him nor did he receive from the witness any time-check signed by him.

J. M. Scott of Fredericton operations manager for Fraser Companies Limited identified the accused as the man who presented a time-check to him in Fredericton in August 1919 and who received cash for it.

Charge Amended.

The charge was amended to uttering a forged time-check knowing it to be forged. P. J. Hughes appeared for the defence and R. B. Hanson, K. C. for the complainant company. Adjournment was made until Monday at twelve o'clock.

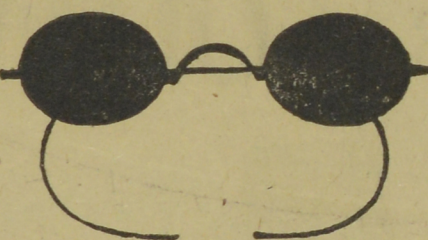
most successful missionaries of the Maritime Baptists. Last year he reported one of the best in the history of the field.
