

TRAFALGAR DAY TO BE WELL OBSERVED

PRESENTATION TO FAMILY OF HERO

In Memory of Victor Hatheway,
Who Went Down With His
Ship in the Battle
of Coronel.

Thursday the 21st inst is the anniversary of the Battle of Trafalgar and the death of Lord Nelson. It will be observed in Fredericton in a most fitting manner by a presentation at the Gaiety Theatre to a member of the family of the late Pictor Hatheway of this city who went down at the battle of Coronel serving as a midshipman on the Good Hope. He was one of the few Canadians who served with Admiral Craddock's squadron and was the first Fredericton man to give his life in the war.

A picture of the Good Hope, handsomely framed will be presented. Mrs. John Black has interested herself in this matter and it is largely through her efforts that the presentation will be made. It will take place at five o'clock. Children of the public schools are specially invited to attend but adults also are to attend. Theodore Roberts well known as a writer, will deliver an address upon Craddock's squadron and its glorious end.

To Visit the Schools
Thursday morning members of the Navy League will visit the various public schools of the city and will speak to the pupils upon the day and its significance.

Mr. Boone owes his life to the courage of William Coyle who was digging potatoes in neighboring field. On account of a strong breeze he did not hear Mr. Boone's cries at first. Later he went to his aid and knocked the bull to his knees with a blow of a potato fork.

CHIEF INSPECTOR W. D. WILSON MUST SAY WHETHER OR NOT HE WILL RESIGN OR CONTINUE

Government Began Its Meeting This Morning — Failure of
Trains to Connect Delayed Members Last Night—No Cabinet
Appointments at This Meeting—Hydro-Electric Com-
mission to be Completed—May be a Surprise.

The Provincial Government opened its monthly meeting here this morning the first meeting since the general election. The opening should have taken place Tuesday night but failure of the C. N. R. to make connection with the C. P. R. at St. John prevented members of the Government living in the eastern section of the province from reaching Fredericton before this morning.

Chief Inspector Before Government
Much of this morning's session was occupied by a conference with Rev. W. D. Wilson Chief Inspector under the prohibition Act. The session did not end until about 1.45. Premier Foster when asked concerning the conference with the Chief Inspector said that there had been discussion on a variety of topics. He said Rev. Mr. Wilson still was Chief Inspector but he would not deny that there had been discussion on the question of his resignation. The latter never formally had been before the Government but there had been considerable newspaper discussion and statements had been made at various times by Mr. Wilson and others. The Government desired to know what the official intended to do, whether he would remain Chief Inspector or not.

Possible Surprise
The Premier in regard to the appointments to the Hydro-Electric Commission to fill the vacancies caused by the resignations of Hon. C. W. Robinson and Reid McManus M. P. P. said that they probably would be made at this meeting of the Government. When asked concerning a report that Hon. Fred Magee was to succeed Hon. C. W. Robinson on the commission, Premier Foster said such an appointment had not been mentioned. In connection with that there might be a surprise he continued.

No Cabinet Appointments
"I can say positively that there will be none made" was his reply to a query concerning appointments to the provincial cabinet at this meeting of the Government.

Silver Fox Exhibition
James White of Ottawa Assistant to the Chairman and Deputy Head of the Conservation Commission is registered at the Queen Hotel having arrived here today. Mr. White is to be heard by the Government at four o'clock this afternoon relative to provincial assistance for an International Live Silver Fox Exhibition to be held at Montreal November 24, 25 and 26.

Many Present for Meeting.
The meeting of the Government has attracted many from various parts of the Province. Among members of the Legislature who are here are Hon. J. E. Hetherington, Speaker; A. A. Dysart, M. P. P. of Buctouche, and D. W. Mersereau, M. P. P., Hon. L. A. Dugal,

of Edmundston; A. T. LeBlanc, of Shediac, and Arthur T. LeBlanc, of Campbellton are also in the city.

Among provincial officials who are here are W. H. McQuade, John A. Sinclair and C. O. Foss. The latter is secretary of the Hydro-Electric Commission.

Hydro-Electric Matters.
The latter body is not active on account of absence of members. Upon the personnel being completed, work will be pushed. Survey work is being continued steadily, however, Mr. Foss having a number of men at work.

S. R. Weston, of this city recently was at work at Shogomoc. Others are at work on the Musquash.

Lieut. Governor Not Present.
Hon. William Pugsley, Lieut. Governor, is not in the city. He is indisposed at his residence in Rothesay, having trouble with one of his eyes. The meeting of the government will continue today and tomorrow.

Will Referee at Sackville
A. D. (Hump) Campbell will referee the intercollegiate Rugby match between Mt. Allison and U. N. B. at Sackville next week.

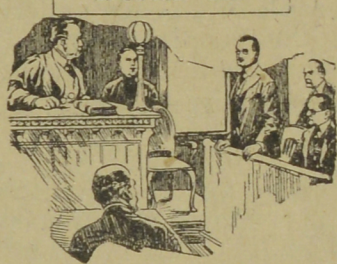
Shot for a Deer.

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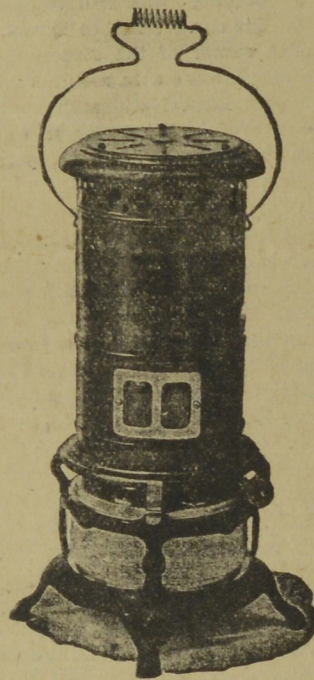
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
