TO BAR LIQUOR TRAFFIC IN FOREIGN COUNTRIES

Dry Leader in the United States Declares That the Nation Has the Power to Control Its Citizens in Foreign Lands—The Treaty With China is Cited—Would Extend Prohibition Statutes to Americans Abroad.

New York Jan. 28—A defence of the bill that has been introduced in Congress to prevent American citizens from engaging in the liquor traffic in certain foreign countries was made yesterday in a statement from Wayne B. Wheeler general counsel of the Anti-Saloon League of America.

The bill he says, has the indorsement and backing of the Anti-Saloon League the National W. C. T. U., the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America and the national council composed from temperance organizations and leaders of missionary

boards in the United States.

"The introduction of the bill in Congress has raised many inquiries as to how this can be done. Manufacturers of liquor and those bibulously inclined see in it a new menace to personal liberty.

"The basis upon which this legislation rests is what is known as extra-territoriality. It is a system which has been developed with increasing power since 1687, when it was first suggested by a Chinese official that an English offender in China should be punished by his own nation. This system was brought to a more successful consummation by the treaty of the United States with China in 1844, on the eve of our sixty-eighth anniversary.

"The treaty in question provided that all citizens of the United States who may commit any crime in China shall be punished only by the consul and other public functionary of the United States, thereto authorized according to the law of the United States.

"The consuls in China became judges of the consular courts in their

jurisdiction covers a variety of subjects. Inasmuch as many of these consuls are not especially versed in the law it was decided to establish a United States court in China. The law was finally adopted in 1906 and the court opened for business in 1907. Judge Charles S. Lobinger is judge of the United States Court in China today.

"Congress has the power to extend any law of the United States of America consular districts in foreign countries. This principle of extending legislation by the federal government was established when laws were enacted by Congress to make the statutes of Virginia enforceable in part of the District of Columbia which had been ceded by that State. There are many illustrations of this legislative power to extend operations of laws."

When the absence of the Sunday inebriates was drawn to the notice of Magistrate Frothingham in the Tombs Court, he said:

"The situation, though nothing to be surprised at, is very satisfactory. I do not drink, but I am strongly opposed to prohibition as a constitutional amendment. I consider it an interference with liberty and directly opposed to the constitution and it is not a federal matter, anyhow. But the type of drunkard that comes through these courts is going to find benefit. He invariably represents a man who was on his way home and yielded to temptation in the shape of a saloon that confronted him at every turn.

"With that eliminated the danger removed, his mind is diverted into other channels, and we are spared the trouble of dealing with him in court. The men who are determined to get drunk at all hazards are, I think, very few. The passing of the old-time saloon is a blessing, but that does not alter my pronounced ideas on the principle of prohibition secured by constitutional amendment."

GEN. CURRIE WILL NOT GO INTO POLITICS

General Sir Arthur Currie, who is in Toronto to confer with the local militia authorities on matters connected with the reorganization of the forces here, stated yesterday that he had no intention or desire to engage in any other sphere of work than the one in which he was at present engaged. The suggestion of General Victor Odlum that he should aspire to leadership of the Unionist party he characterized as a tribute from one of his former Brigadiers, exemplifying the confidence the officers of the Canadian Corps had in each other. He spoke in glowing terms of the work done in the war by General Odlum and said that he would make a valuable valuable member of Parliament himself. General Currie forecasted an early announcement of the reorganization of Toronto's militia. The announcement already made, said he, regarding the reorganization of the Canadian Militia had been well received. All the artillery units had been perpetuated in the new militia, and he hoped, he said, to be able to make announcements shortly regarding the other branches of the service which would be as well received as the former.

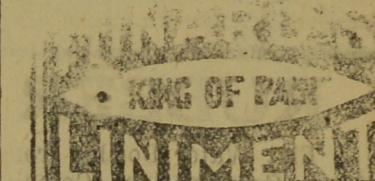
