

Mrs. H. H. Asquith Very Much in the English Eye—Spook Cure Failed and Patient Died.

Mrs. Herbert Asquith has Britain forgetting labor strikes, Irish affairs and world reconstruction—and even the "licker" question passes unnoticed. She is a Tartar in the general consensus of opinion and now, with her husband coming back into political eminence, the wisacres foresee a clash between her and the real first lady of the land, Mrs. Lloyd George, who is about everything that Mrs. Asquith is not. Ten years ago Mrs. Asquith wanted a divorce, just to be fashionable, but hadn't any legal ground; then she wrote a book and had a salon that was a "burd" according to the mean gossips. Mrs. Lloyd George is chairman of the prudential committee of the First Baptist Church in their home town in Wales, is a suff, and a dry and stands for the general Victorian ideas, including Sunday school for the kids and twice a day in church for pa.

Mrs. Antoinette Imbimbo—at least that's the name she goes by—has been sent to prison in Manhattan, N. ## N. B. FEDERATION OF LABOR TABLED RESOLUTION

ure at the formation of Farmers organizations and cordially invite the United Farmers to cooperate with the Labor Movement.

This was warmly supported by many delegates, warmly opposed by others, and laid on the table by a majority vote.

Afternoon Session.

In considering Resolution No. 5, relating to co-operative stores, Eugene R. Steeves of Moncton explained the Moncton Co-operative Store and Geo. Crawford and others the Fredericton venture. Moncton pays five to six per cent. on investment; the first half year's profits were left in the business, and a good dividend is expected this month. Customers are allowed credit up to the limit of their transferable stock. No one person may have more than \$400 stock.

Moncton labor men desired to do away with all unnecessary middlemen.

President Melanson said the Moncton Co-operative Co. paid better wages to help than other stores.

Geo. Crawford, of Fredericton, said Fredericton gave credit only on with-

drawable stock issued in \$5 shares. There were 250 co-operators.

Resolution No. 6, asking for greater representation in the Legislature for Moncton, brought out some discussion. It was participated in by Delegates H. H. Stuart, F. W. Henderson, E. R. Steeves, J. E. Tighe the President and L. Sugrue, all of whom demanded proportional representation.

Resolution No. 7, on rents, evoked much comment on landlordism. The compulsory feature was somewhat objected to, but the section carried unanimously. Bitter protest was made against the undue raising of rents in cities and elsewhere. Numerous instances were cited in St. John of rent being raised as much as \$72 a year to meet a \$15 raise in taxes.

Resolution No. 13 advocating closer relations of labor with the farmers, divided the house. Delegate H. H. Stuart, who introduced it, B. Kennedy of the United Mine Workers of Minto, Geo. Hennessy of St. John, the President, I. D. Farris, J. E. Tighe and others supported the resolution, arguing that the farmers being workers as well as owners were valiant allies of labor in the latter's efforts to eliminate useless middlemen and overcome profiteering.

Other delegates opposed making advances to a political party. Delegate Ryan of Fredericton objected to the Farmers' opposition co-operative organization. The Ontario Coalition government was cited and the discussion was most spirited and general.

All the Moncton and Minto speakers and some of those from St. John supported the motion. It was as strongly opposed by Fredericton and St. John speakers. Finally, on motion of F. A. Campbell, the resolution

## NOTICE OF LEGISLATION.

Public notice is hereby given that application will be made at the next session of the Legislative Assembly, by the City of Fredericton, for the passage of a bill or bills for the following purposes:

(a) To amend the City of Fredericton Assessment Act, 1907, and in particular section 46 thereof, so as to provide that tax notices may be mailed to ratepayers or delivered personally, as the City Treasurer may decide, under the direction of the Finance Committee.

(b) That the said Assessment Act be further amended so as to provide that all females assessed on income or property, real or personal, within the City of Fredericton, and who shall have paid their taxes within the time limited thereby by the said Act, shall be entitled to vote at City elections.

(c) For authority to make a grant for a Memorial in memory of soldiers who lost their lives during the Great War, either by way of assessment or by borrowing, as the City Council may decide.

(d) For authority to grant to the John Palmer Company, Limited, exemption from taxation for a period of twenty years from and including the year 1920; free sewerage for the same period of time under such limitation as the City Council may decide, and water for all purposes at the fixed rate of ten cents per thousand gallons, for the said period of twenty years.

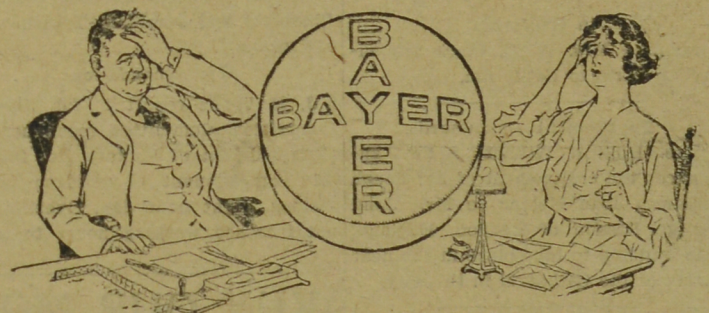
