## HYDRO DEVELOPMENT

In commenting on the progressive policy of the provincial government for the development of the water powers of the province with a view of supplying the people with cheaper light and power the St. John Times-Star says.

"If any man had predicted before the Foster Government came into office that an electric current from Musquash and Lepreau would be brought to St. John, and linked up with another current generated above Fredericton, and carried on to Moncton to be linked up with another from the North Shore—all resulting from water power development—he would have been set down as a romancer or a teller of fairy tales. Yet this is on the eve of accomplishment. Surveys have shown that the power is available, and only needs to be harnessed. What it will mean to the various sections of the province where the electric current is to be distributed one does not need to dwell upon. The people of the province have every reason to be glad they exchanged a government which squandered the resources of the province for one which not only conserves but develops them. The use of money to develop water power is in the interests of the people, and the government is to be congratulated upon the vigor with which it has taken up the work. The law governing the case amply protects the province from exploitation by owners of property where power is to be developed, and while no hardship should be imposed on any such owner the public interest must be paramount. The announcement made yesterday comes as a most agreeable revelation of possibilities hitherto unsuspected by most people."

Premier Foster and his colleagues in the government are certainly to be congratulated upon their efforts to provide the people with the boon of cheap power and light. Coal is steadily advancing in price and it is absolutely necessary that water powers should be harnessed and made to work for the people. The pleasing announcement is made that when the water powers are harnessed the electric current will be available not only for the towns and cities, but for the municipalities as well. This means that the farmers of the province will be able to light their homes and outbuildings by electricity at a low cost, and will have power available to drive churns and separators, washing machines, flanning mills, root pulpers, etc. In short the government's hydro policy is designed to stimulate production both in the factory and on the farm and will benefit all classes of the population.

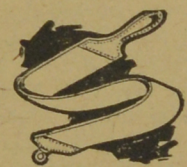
