LIBERALS ARE TAKING MORE AGGRESSIVE STAND

Have Forced the Government to Abandon Its Ruthless Methods of Procedure—A Bombardment of Questions—Ministers Were Loathe to Give Information, But Were Brought to Time—Mr. Rowell as a Pacifier.

(Toronto Globe)

Ottawa, April 2—There has been one noticeable change in the temper of the Commons during the last week and that has been in the attitude of the Opposition toward the Government. Within the last few days the Liberals have bared their teeth to the Government, and this change caused some surprise to members of the Cabinet. This was particularly noticeable on Tuesday night, when the members of the Government, from carelessly turning aside the demands of the Liberal leader, Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, for information, hurriedly decided it was better to comply with at least some of his requests.

The Liberals had made up their minds in caucus not to permit the passing of the \$20,000,000 appropriation for the completion of the merchant marine shipbuilding program with out first getting certain information from the Government, together with the assurance that in future the Cabinet would let contracts by tender, in compliance with the statutes, and not on the word of a Minister, a method which gained favor during the war. For three hours on Tuesday evening they fired questions at the Minister of Marine and Naval Affairs, Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, and then, just when the Government expected the vote to pass Hon. Mr. King called a halt in proceedings.

Questions Ignored

On two or three occasions the preceding the Liberals had endeavored to find out where the Government expected to secure the \$20,000,000. The questions were disallowed by the Chairman, and the Government refused to give the information. An attempt to find out if another popular loan were to be resorted to was brushed aside, too. After all these attempts had failed, the Liberal Leader arose and very firmly informed the Cabinet Ministers of whom there were three or four in the House that he would ask that the item stand over unless the information was forthcoming. This suggestion was not heeded, but when Hon. Mr. King followed it up by warning the Government that all future estimates would be held up unless, in these times of stringency the Government was prepared to disclose partially its plans as to where it was to procure the funds, the Ministers began to take notice.

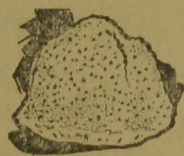
First the Minister of Finance, Sir Henry Drayton, imparted the information that he did not expect there would be another loan. Hon. N. W. Rowell who was leading the House

also attempted to pacify the Opposition. He endeavored with some show of heat to impress upon his former political friends that it would be contrary to Parliamentary procedure to make public the information asked for before the Budget was brought down. Again the Liberal Leader intimated that estimates would be permitted to pass much more quickly if the information were forthcoming, and suggested that the bringing down of the Budget be not long delayed. The vote was then allowed to pass.

Exacted a Promise

This little set-to was really the second notice of the opening of hostilities by the Opposition. The first came a few days before, when the Liberals and Farmers raised a row over the disfranchising clause of the new Election Bill. In that instance they, of course secured a promise of the righting of their complaint. The Farmers have been by no means militant since the opening of the House. However, they, too are girding on their armor now preparatory to opposing clause 10 of the Election Bill, it being the section which restricts contributions to political campaign funds.

While the Opposition during the first month did little criticizing of Government measures, it has been active in securing much information which may be put to use later on. At different times the Acting Premier, Sir George Foster, has virtually pleaded for the Liberals to "let up" in their deluge of requests for documents and correspondence and information. On Wednesday there were no fewer than 132 questions on the order paper requesting information from the government. When Sir George Foster was questioned about the delay in presenting the requested information he promised that it would be forthcoming in due course, but said it was impossible for the departments to keep up with the demand at present.

OLD GAME WITH GOLD PIECES

New York, April 5—A battle royal and a game of "Button, button, who's got the button?" among a gipsy gang a week ago in Canal street, Brooklyn has led the participants into court to settle an otherwise strictly tribal affair.

The buttons on the coat of John B. Costello when he is in holiday attire are made of five-dollar gold pieces. Even the smaller buttons that were intended solely as ornaments to the sleeves and pocket flaps are made of two-and-a-half-dollar gold pieces.

This was the reason for the arraignment of Thomas Campione this morning on a short affidavit charging robbery.

A week ago tonight a group of gipsies were fighting near 209 Canal street. Campione, it is charged was among but not of them. Patrolman Corbett stopped the fight, and Costello, who had been in the middle of the fracas, counted his buttons. He claims they were checked up short and puts his total loss on the day of \$1,540, only part of which robbery was in buttons. A dozen accusing fingers were levelled at Campione.
