## CO-OPERATION

It is rather strange that in the struggle against the high cost of living the people of this country do not turn to co-operation for relief. In Great Britain the co-operative stores taken together embrace more capital and do a larger turnover than almost any other enterprise in the nation, and in Russia, we are told, the co-operative stores have weathered the storms of the Revolution and the ravages of Bolshevism. In 1844, twenty-four poor men of Rochdale, most of them flannel weavers, decided to make the experiment, and by hard scraping got together \$140. This was a small beginning indeed, yet we are told that by 1906 there were 1,400 such stores in the United Kingdom, and their sales for the year amounted to \$315,000,000. The membership today is nearly three millions, which means that three million families with upwards of 15,000,000 persons buy as a unit, on the co-operative plan, get their little metal cheques with their purchases and cash these at stated intervals, constituting their dividends. These co-operative stores flourish all over the country, the maximum capital held by one person being one thousand dollars. Their government is Democratic, or the one man one vote system and the directors are all workmen. Associated with the co-operative stores are various co-operative societies which carry on both wholesale buying and manufacturing. The stores and societies altogether employ one hundred and fifty thousand persons all told, and the years' business of all amounts to over five hundred million dollars. The story of British co-operation has been one of success, and the system has had a wonderful effect on prices in the United Kingdom. Do we lack the courage and skill to do the same thing in Canada?

## OUR GROWING TIME

The bill to incorporate the Fraser Paper Company, Limited, was before the Corporations Committee of the Legislature yesterday and was received with enthusiasm by members on both sides of politics. Such an important measure lends strength to the belief that the province of New Brunswick is now on the eve of greater things. The Messrs. Fraser have already given striking evidence of an abiding faith in the future of this province. They are large employers of labor and have done much already to develop the natural resources of this province, and they are ready to do more. It is but natural, therefore, that members of the Legislature show a disposition to encourage such a spirit of enterprise.

Mr. Baxter, who pretend to be an authority on constitutional law, says that no Minister has a right to administer a department of a government involving the expenditure of public money without first submitting himself to the people. Mr. Baxter should take a look around and see how things are done at Ottawa where a government which he supported is in power.

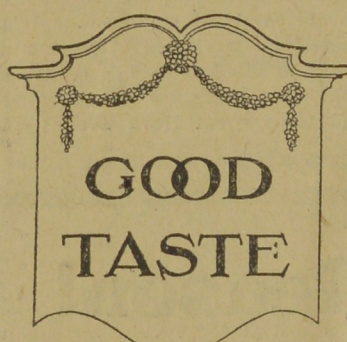
